

Mr. Tilley Describes Imports ant Features of Ontario's Regulations.

MAY TEACH FRENCH

Regulations Provide for Instruction in Two Languages.

Canadian Associated Press Cable.
LONDON, July 18.—The Catholic chools appeal was continued today

Mr. Tilley, for the respondents, referred anew to the important features of the regulations, pointing out that they applied to public and separate schools alike. French, where neces-sary in the case of French-speaking pupils, was authorized to be used as pupils, was authorized to be used as the language of instruction and communication, but not without the approval of the chief inspector, beyond the first form, which normally covered the first two years of the school. Under certain conditions a school where French had hitherto been a subject of study, could provide for instruction in French reading and grammar, etc..
