FIRST RASPBERRIES OF SEASON HAVE ARRIVED Sent From Lorne Park and Sold at Twenty-five Cents Per Box.

CHERRIES IN DEMAND Hot House Cucumbers Had Good Sale—Gooseberries Still a Drug.

The first raspberries for this season arrived on the market yesterday from Mrs. Helmer of Lorne Park to White & Co., and sold at 25c per box.

Cherries were quite brisk and sold readily at 15c per bushel; the bulk bringing 10c and 11c.

Cherries were only shipped in small quantities yesterday, but were of much better quality than last week's receipts, and there is more demand for them now.

Six-quart baskets of choice black ones brought \$1 to \$1.25; the 6-quart lew baskets of the sour variety selling at 50c and 60c.

Gooseberries—still a drug on the market, 11-quart baskets selling at 35c per bushel, according to the size of the fruit.

Leamington hot-house cucumbers, after being cleaned up some time, were covered yesterday with a good demand at higher prices, the entire market being cleaned up the bulk of the No. 1's selling at 12c per bushel; No. 2's chiefly brought 8c and 9c.

Hot-house tomatoes held firm, the 11-quart baskets selling at 22c to 25c each.

Canadian new carrots and beets are coming in more freely, selling at 50c and 35c per dozen bunches.

Green peas, flat-top stationary, the bulk selling at 6c and 7c per 11-quart basket; at 5c and 6c per bushel.

Beans—Canadian, increasing in shipments, and have declined slightly, selling at 15c per bushel.

Three cars of tomatoes, two from Ontario, one from California, are being sold at 15c per bushel.

Carrots—New, 11-quart baskets, \$1.25 to \$1.50; 6-quart baskets, 50c to 60c.

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CALIFORNIA MARKET FOR HEAVY STEERS VERY SLOW

Medium to Light Butchers' Cattle Were Steady at Stock Yards.

VEAL CALVES WERE FIRM

Hogs Took Considerable Drop and Spring Lambs Two Dollars Lower.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards yesterday were 196 cars—283 light calves, 880 hogs, 728 sheep and 480 hammers.

The market for heavy steers was very slow at the stock yards yesterday at prices from 2c to 5c lower than last week.

Medium to light butcher cattle, cows, bulls, milkers and springers, were steady at prices quoted below.

Veal calves were steady, with spring lambs were 2c per cwt. lower.

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WHEAT REGISTERS SLIGHT RECOVERY

Conflicting Reports of Black Rust Keep Market Nervous.

PRICES FLUCTUATE

Sale of Half Million Bushels for Export Helps Prices.

CHICAGO, July 10.—Conflicting reports of the presence of black rust in the Dakotas, kept the wheat market nervous today, the bullish tendency being dominated, and the close was strong at the high point, with a net advance of 1/8c to 1 1/2c, with July leading at 81 1/2c and September at 81 1/2c.

Grain finished from a shade to 1/4c to 1/2c higher, and provisions varied from unchanged to 1/2c lower than Saturday's last.

Weakness at the start in the wheat market on the absence of fresh evidence of black rust danger was followed by advance on messages telling of further reports of the disease, but a break in the report by the man who sent the black rust report weakened the market.

The market bulged after reports of the presence of the rust in various localities, none of which graded as any great danger in sight. The advance caused by the agitation over the black rust was added by news from seaboard that 500,000 bushels of wheat had been sold for export.

Grain markets in general were bullish, but black rust reports remained the principal factor in the market, and it was expected that the black rust reports would make an investigation into actual crop conditions. The strength held to the end of the session, with cash sales of wheat aggregated 1,000,000 bushels.

Corn moved in sympathy with wheat, the net narrow limits, good weather reports falling to weaken the price, and to reflect the trend of the other grain, high temperature in the southern part of the country being feared.

Provisions were slow and weaker, with hams being credited as important articles. Lower live hog prices also contributed to the weakness.

BRILLIANT MANOEUVRES OF BRUSILOFF SUCCEEDED

Germans Lose All Advantages Gained in Recent Counter-Offensive.

Loss of Kovel May Be Followed by Flight Over Huge Front.

PETROGRAD, July 10.—The right wing of General Brusiloff's armies, by brilliant manoeuvres between the Stokhod and Strv Rivers, north of Lutsk, has succeeded, it is declared, in completely offsetting all the advantages obtained by the German forces before Kovel, and the one weakness of the Russian army, the front which developed after the drive through the opposing lines at Lutsk, has now been repaired.

By the capture of the Germans have been concentrating their forces and successfully defending the Rovno-Kovel line. The result of this advance, which has driven the defenders well back upon the Stokhod line of fortification.

By the capture of the villages of Goevitch and Kkacheva the Russians have further imperiled the German hold on Kovel. In the event Kovel falls, military experts declare the Germans will be forced to retreat on the entire front northeast to Baranovitch in order to straighten out their line.

If Germany is to hold the invaded parts of Poland and Lithuania it is essential for her to keep Baranovitch on the river, and a 12-hour trip by rail from the Baltic.

ITALIANS CLEAR OUT FOE FROM TOFANE VALLEY

Capture Important Peaks and Defeat Austrians Near Gorizia.

LONDON, July 10.—The Italian war office announces today that Alpine detachments have cleared the Austrians out of a great part of the Tofane Valley on the upper Boite, between peaks No. 7 and No. 2, and they have captured a strong position on Tofane No. 1, commanding the valley. They surrounded the garrison of this last peak, taking 190 prisoners.

Between the Astico and the Brenta the artillery and air services on both sides were active. Austrian shells set fire to Pedesclav and other places in the Astico Valley. An attempt of the enemy to attack Monte Selugio was promptly checked.

On the heights northwest of Gorizia, on the Isonzo front, the Austrians launched an attack against the Italians, but they were checked by artillery fire.

ALLIES MAKE GAINS ON SOMME FRONT

Determined German Attempts Fail to Stem Great Offensive.

BRITISH PRESS ON After Taking Trones Wood, They Advance Further Northward.

LONDON, July 10.—The Anglo-French armies pressed forward on both sides of the River Somme in severe fighting last night, despite determined German attempts to stem the great offensive.

The German War Office admitted this afternoon that British troops penetrated Trones Wood, north of the river. Berlin also admits that the French penetrated the Village of Biches, less than a mile from the City of Peronne, the Village of Barieux and other German positions. In several encounters the Germans were forced to yield ground, and afterwards regaining the lost positions by counter-attacks, the German War Office claimed.

A brief bulletin from General Haig, British commander-in-chief, announced that the British, after capturing the southern end of Trones Wood, have made further progress northward.

The French War Office announced slight advances north of the Somme and the capture of 500 yards of German trenches in a surprise attack in the Champagne region. The German War Office contradicted this statement with the announcement that all fresh attacks in the Champagne were repulsed.
