Applications to Parliament. APPLICATION TO PARLIAMENT. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an application will be made by the Corporation of the City of Toronto to the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario at the next session thereof for an act providing as follows:

1. The Council of the Corporation of the City of Toronto may by bylaw establish a Commission, under the name of the Toronto Transportation Commission, with the powers, rights, authorities and privileges hereinafter set forth:

2. The said Commission shall be a body corporate and shall consist of three members, each of whom shall be a resident of the City of Toronto, and shall be appointed by the Council of the Corporation of the City of Toronto on the nomination of the Board of Control, and no appointment shall be made by such Council in the absence of such nomination except on the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of the members of the Council present and voting, and the members so appointed shall hold office for three years and until their successors are appointed.

3. Where a vacancy in the Commission occurs from any cause, the Council shall immediately appoint, in the preceding paragraph, a member who shall hold office for the remainder of the term of his predecessor as appointed.

4. Any member shall be eligible for reappointment on the termination of his term of office.

5. The members of the Commission shall act without salary.

6. The Council of the said Corporation upon the Corporation acquiring such property of the Toronto Railway Company as the said Corporation is entitled to acquire under the provisions of the said Act, shall, in the period of the agreement between the Corporation and the Company set forth in Schedule "A" to the Act passed in the fifth year of the reign of her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 99, or under the provisions of the said Statute, shall by bylaw entrust to the said Commission the control, operation and management thereof and also the control, operation and management of the said Corporation.

7. Upon such bylaw or bylaws being passed, the said Commission shall, in the exercise of its powers, rights, authorities and privileges of the said Corporation as to the construction, operation and management of street railways by any general or special Act conferred upon the said Corporation, shall, in regard to the said Corporation, take over as if the said Corporation were the said Corporation and not by the Corporation.

10. The said Commission shall, in particular, but not limited to, exercise the following powers and duties, namely: (1) To establish, control, operate and manage new lines of street railway or extensions to existing lines.

(2) To establish, control, operate and manage all transportation facilities entrusted to it and to fix tolls and fares that the income therefrom shall be sufficient to make the said facilities self-sustaining, including the maintenance of all property in good condition and the making of due provision for renewals, depreciation and debt charges.

(3) To make regulations upon the said Corporation in relation to the said Corporation, and to carry out its powers and duties.

11. From and after its establishment the said Commission shall, in relation to the said Corporation, take over as if the said Corporation were the said Corporation and not by the Corporation.

12. The said Commission shall, in particular, but not limited to, exercise the following powers and duties, namely: (1) To establish, control, operate and manage new lines of street railway or extensions to existing lines.

REPORT ON SUCCESS OF HOUSING PROJECT Estimate of Five Thousand New Homes for Ontario This Year.

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—(By Canadian Press).—Housing acts, adopting the federal project for which \$25,000,000 was set aside on February 20, 1919, have either been passed or are being prepared in each of the nine provinces, according to Mr. Thomas Adams, town planning adviser to the commission of conservation, British Columbia city.

Ontario has made most progress in housing development. About 1,400 houses have been erected or are under construction in Ontario, and some 90 municipal schemes have been prepared or are under consideration. It is estimated that between 4,000 and 5,000 houses will be erected this year in Ontario if money is available.

The amount actually borrowed by the provinces and the estimates now available indicate that the bulk of the federal appropriation of \$25,000,000 will be taken up during the present year.
