C. P. R. steamship *Mount Temple*, which vessel was ashore at Ironbound Island on the Nova Scotia coast, arrived at Halifax Saturday afternoon and was put on the dry dock. Saturday's Halifax Mail says: "There is some doubt regarding the ownership of the steamer. As a rule if a steamer is not floated within three months, the underwriters must take her. What will be done in this case is problematical. At any rate, the steamer is here, and it is up to the Halifax workmen to make it possible for the Dry Dock Company to complete successfully with other companies when tenders are called for her repair."

FLY THE FLAG ON ST. GEORGE'S DAY

Members of St. George's Society Working to Arouse Patriotic Sentiment Among Citizens

There is every likelihood that St. George's day, April 23d, will see a more liberal display of the national flag of the British Empire than has been the case in past years.

St. George's Society has undertaken the very commendable task of arousing patriotic sentiment among the citizens to this end.

The following resolution dealing with the matter was passed at the last meeting of the society:

Whereas the twenty-third of April, the Festival of St. George—England's day, for a number of years a public holiday in England, should be more generally observed, and is annually being more widely celebrated both in England, and through out the Empire, as a day of national importance—therefore

Resolved, That this Society request the Dominion, Provincial and Civic Governments, and citizens generally, to display their flags on that day; and also request the owners of the City and Province to have flags hoisted on the school houses on St. George's day, and a few minutes instruction given to the scholars on the history of St. George and England, and the meaning of St. George's Cross on the National Flag.

The evening of St. George's day will be marked by a grand ball for which elaborate preparations have been made.
