## SHRUBB TRIED TO GET LONGBOAT TO SPRINT

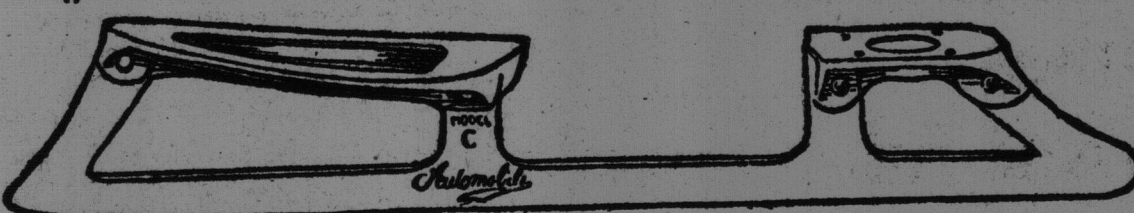
Some New Phases of the Big Marathon Race Are Exposed by Well Known Sporting Writer of Toronto.
