The appointment of a successor to Hon. J. B. Snowball as Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick will probably be made tomorrow.

The Alward-Crandall case against alleged misrepresentation in the sale of a horse, involving some \$80, was resumed before Chief Justice Tuck yesterday afternoon.

While frozen water pipes were being thawed out a fire occurred in the basement of St. Luke's church between 4 and 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

The suburban excursion to Westfield yesterday was a decided success. About one hundred and fifty from the city and county were present.

Judge Ritchie yesterday afternoon allowed Albert Filly, Arthur West and Edward Parr, the three Englishmen who carried revolvers and knives during the Wednesday night, to go on suspended sentence.

St. John last week shipped 3272 barrels as against 2030 barrels for the same week last year. For the season St. John has shipped 32,735 barrels as compared with 19,451 barrels for the same period of one year ago.

FORTY YEARS OF SERVICE

James S. Beek Auditor General of New Brunswick for Forty Years Died This Morning.

Fredericton, March 1—Auditor General James S. Beek died at his residence here at 1.30 o'clock this morning. Mr. Beek was ninety-two years of age and for three months he had been suffering from mental trouble and general breakdown.

He was always interested in everything that tended for the uplifting of the city, and was a strong advocate of temperance. Each year he was elected an officer of the local branch of the Bible Society. For some time he acted as justice of the peace. About three years ago he was awarded the distinction of an imperial service order.

E. B. LeRoy, manager of the Canadian Permanent Mortgage Corporation, has received a letter from Joseph T. Clark, president of the Canadian Press Association, stating that they will probably visit Newfoundland on their annual excursion next summer, and may spend a day in St. John.

MADE A TEST OF STRENGTH. Government Has 33 Majority on Motion of Censure.

OTTAWA, Feb. 28—The feature of today's session in the house was a test of party strength in which the government showed a majority of thirty-three.

There was some discussion as to the procedure of the insurance investigation. He declared that the minister of justice should not have given the insurance commission and Mr. Shepley a free hand.

Mr. Borden complained of the vacancy on the supreme court bench of Nova Scotia. He repeated what he had previously said about there being a great inconvenience caused through the vacancy, which took place when Hon. D. G. Fraser was made lieutenant governor, not being filled and moved an amendment to supply that on account of the vacancy not being filled for eleven months and in the absence of any reasonable explanation for this prolonged delay of their duty it merited the disapproval of the house.

Mr. Aylesworth said that there was no such inconvenience as Mr. Borden had stated. From the information he received the leader of the opposition had magnified the position of affairs. The court was not now in session and the work was well in hand by the five judges who now had charge. Before the court met on March 12 an appointment would be made to fill the vacancy caused by the appointment of Judge Fraser to the governorship.

The resolution of Mr. Borden was defeated by 33 against 50 for, a majority of 33 for the government. Verville (Independent Labor) voted with the government.

In the county court this morning, the case of O'Donnell v. Crandall was adjourned for a week. D. Mullin, K. C., for the plaintiff.
