

ST. STEPHEN'S CHURCH.—The acting Trustees of this Church, (formerly known as the *Asylum Chapel*), but now, by purchase of the building, in connection with the vestry, Church of Scotland, in conjunction with the Minister, Elders, and Trustees of St. Andrew's Church, in this City, at a late meeting of those parties, unanimously agreed upon appointing a Commission composed of six Gentlemen in 1857, to select, as soon as convenient, a suitable site for the site of a new Church, to be erected on the site of the old one, and to be officiated as Minister of St. Stephen's Church, the Commissioners consist of the Rev. Dr. Patrick McParlane, of Greenock; Rev. Dr. Robert Burns, of Paisley; Rev. Dr. George Burns, of Tweedmouth, and Messrs. Matthew Montgomery, Richard Johnston, and William H. Dobie, Esquires, of Glasgow.—The whole proceedings on the subject have been very unanimously approved of by that portion of the community claiming connection with the Church of Scotland, and a spirit of good fellowship has prevailed throughout.—The following Gentlemen compose the acting Trustees of St. STEPHEN'S, viz.—John Robertson, Thomas Walker, John Walker, Hugh Mackay, and John Wabart, Esquires, under whose management the various necessary alterations and improvements in the edifice will be effected, with all necessary dispatch.—This second place of worship in connection with the Established Church of Scotland will no doubt be highly prized by the increasing adherents of that Church in this city, who may from habit or inclination prefer the form of faith so long professed and cherished by their fathers.

At a Meeting of the President and Directors of the *Saint John Mechanics' Work Fitting Company*, held on the 25th ult., Mr. ALEXANDER ROBERTSON was appointed Secretary to the Company, Mr. HOLMAN being resigned.

Several Communications and other articles have been received, from making many copies of the "Legislative Reporter" this week. We have, however, given a good share of the most essential part of the routine business of the House; and in our next paper will give more space to the Debates.

Yesterday a Coroner's Inquest was held on view of the body of WILLIAM HIGGINS, a youth of about 8 years of age, (son of a poor Irishman) who accidentally drowned himself in the *Macanabique*, whaler, on Sunday last.—Verdict accordingly.

ARRIVED AT ST. JOHN'S, 1836.
The Council House of Assembly of Nova Scotia have adopted a joint Address to His Majesty and the Imperial Parliament, praying that the recommendation of the Select Committee of the House of Commons for a change in the duties on timber and other articles imported into the United Kingdom, may not be adopted.

The Gentlemen commissioned to select a minister for the Church of St. Andrew's, in the city of Quebec, vacant by the death of the Rev. John Harkness, have unanimously presented the Rev. John Cook, assistant minister at Cambridge, in the Presbytery of Dunbarton, to the vacant charge. Mr. Cook has accepted the presentation.

Several Communications are unavoidably postponed.

ABOLITION OF THE COURTS.—We insert in another column an Ordinance, issued on Saturday last, by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Executive Council, regarding the several Ordinances for establishing Circuit Courts in the different Counties of this Province.

This proceeding on the part of His Excellency, appears to have taken almost every one by surprise, and we have heard different reasons assigned for its adoption at this particular time. By some it is asserted that it is consequent upon a new arrangement to be made in the Courts, while others suppose it to have been adopted, because the House of Assembly, on the day previous to the date of the Ordinance, took a resolution for the travelling expenses of the Judges on the Continent.

Which of these is the real cause of this hasty proceeding, we are unable to say. A writer in our paper, assumes the latter, and wishes to throw the odium of the measure on the House of Assembly. For our own part, we are not disposed to view it in that light. We cannot think that any of our Judges are so parsimonious, as to put in great inconvenience and expense, because the travelling charges was withheld by one branch of the Legislature. Indeed sufficient time does not appear to have elapsed between the decision of the House and the issuing of the Ordinance, for His Excellency to have consulted all the Judges on the subject, or for the calling of a Council, to deliberate on the subject, and on these accounts we are disposed to view the proceeding in the most favourable light.—*Courier of Saturday.*

PARISH SCHOOLS.—It is much to the credit of this country that the Legislature has responded to the wishes of the people, in applying as much of the common treasure as could be spared to the advancement of education. These means have been necessarily circumscribed, but they have been such as to afford no small encouragement, and therefore it could hardly have been expected that masters of very eminent talents would be found ready to undertake the onerous duties of a parochial School, yet it can be proved that many worthy men, of excellent education, have accepted of these circumscribed means, and acquitted themselves with honour to their own consciences and to the advantage of their charge. We deprecate the modern mean attempt to fix a common stigma on the whole class for inability and immorality; because, until it can be shown that sufficient means have been employed to obviate the former, and an adequate system enforced to prevent the latter, the blame—in all probability—lies in the imperfection of the system. In fact the assertions of several members in their speeches replies show that an ill-working system is in operation, that it is a puzzle how to amend it, and that no scheme has yet been devised which will correct the errors of the present mode or even hold out a promise of being likely to do so.—*St. Andrew's Standard.*

A Bill is now before the House of Assembly, which if it pass must have an important influence on the interests of this and the neighbouring Province.—We mean the measure brought forward by Mr. Cunliffe for protecting the Fisheries, by restricting the Americans from violating the Convention, which gave them a right to fish at a certain distance from our shores. We do not think there is in our Assembly, an individual, who is not fully alive to the necessity which now exists, of using the most extreme measures, in order to preserve to the Colony the exclusive right to the fishery under the terms of the Convention. And not only is Nova Scotia called upon, but the sister Colony of New Brunswick, which benefits by the fishery, must be American infringement in the same situation with ourselves, and nearly as much interested as Nova Scotia, to preserve the integrity of her coasts. The shameful practices to which the Americans resort, with regard to the fishery, in destroying their produce, and the great amount of smuggling which is carried on under the pretence of entering our harbours for shelter, have a very productive of most injurious consequences to our property, and also to that of New Brunswick. If the Bill before the House pass into a law, it will be accompanied home by a strong remonstrance, and our neighbours, who are now in Parliamentary Session, will have a grand opportunity of returning a very decisive vote of their disapprobation of a similar act of our Legislature, at the very commencement of the Session, so handsomely tendered to their interests by their address on the Timber trade, in the session of the two Provinces is intimately connected, therefore we have no doubt that the New Brunswick Legislature will readily receive our remonstrances stronger, by joining in setting forth their own well-founded complaints against American aggression.—*Halifax Times.*

Extract of a letter from Bermuda, dated Jan. 1.—"We never saw the consumption of all kinds of Fish so dull as at present. Many of the employers giving the negroes time in lieu of their allowance of this article. Mackerel has been in good demand for some time, but would not bring for spring over \$4, fall \$3; Beef is the only article in demand. Dry fish \$3 in lots, scale \$2.—*Halifax paper.*

By His Excellency Major-General Sir ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL, Bart., G. C. B., Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New-Branswick, &c.
Whereas by an Ordinance made and passed by the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Council, on the eighteenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-eight, the days and times appointed by the said Ordinance to be annually held in the several Counties of this Province, except the County of York, on the days and times therein particularly mentioned and set forth, and whereas by a certain other Ordinance in like manner made and passed on the twenty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-eight, the days and times appointed by the above in part recited Ordinance were annulled, and a Court of Assize and Nisi Prius was also appointed to be annually held on the fourth Tuesday in September, in the then newly erected County of Kent.

And whereas by a certain other Ordinance in like manner made and passed on the twenty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one, the times for holding the said Courts of Assize and Nisi Prius in the County of Kent were altered, and a Court of Assize and Nisi Prius was also appointed to be annually held on the fourth Tuesday in September, in the then newly erected County of Kent, and whereas by a certain other Ordinance in like manner made and passed on the twenty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two, a Circuit Court was appointed to be held in the County of Kent on the first Tuesday in September in each year, and the times appointed by the above in part recited Ordinance for holding the Circuit Courts in the County of Kent and Southwestern were altered and newly appointed, as in the said last mentioned Ordinance is particularly set forth, and whereas it is expedient that the said several Ordinances should be repealed,

I do therefore, by and with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Executive Council, hereby ordain and declare that the said several Ordinances, hereby recited and declared, and every of them be, and the same be, hereby repealed, and the Justice of the Supreme Court, and all other Persons who are or may be affected by the said several Ordinances, in witness whereof, I have signed these Presents, and caused the Great Seal of the Province to be hereunto affixed, at Fredericton, the thirtieth day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, and in the sixth year of His Majesty's said Majesty's reign.
