**LEONARD NOT A
ONE PUNCH FIGHTER**

Uses More Finesse Than Former
Champions But He is Just as
Effective
When Benny Leonard failed to stop
Jack Britton in their recent bout he
lets a grand opportunity to convince the
doubting ones as to whether he is as
great a lightweight champion as he is
as the others that preceded him. If
Britton had opened up and fought toe
to toe Leonard might have brought him
down, but when the bigger man covered
up the smaller could do nothing with
him.
The critical ones do not accept this as
an adequate excuse, however. They say
that if Kid Lavigne or Terry McGovern
had been in there with Britton that
night his attempt to cover up would
not have saved him. McGovern would
have stood in close and whaled away un-
til something dropped, and Lavigne
would have done the same thing, say
the admirers of the heroes that are gone.
Leonard's answer to this sort of criti-
cism is that he is not that kind of a
fighter. Instead of beating his man
down by main strength and aggressive-
ness he uses more finesse. Leonard as-
serts that he tried to make Britton open
up by backing away from him, as he
realized that it would have been foolish
to risk breaking his hands on an elbow
by flogging away when he had no clear
mark to shoot at. But Britton was too
cautious to be fooled by this manoeuvre
and the only result was to make Leon-
ard look as though he was none too sure
of himself.
Just what is the best procedure when
an opponent covers up with both arms
wrapped around his head and his stom-
ach drawn in and protected by a
crouching attitude has puzzled most
fighters. Joe Gans solved it on one oc-
casion by taking aim and driving his
fist against his opponent's glove so hard
that the latter was knocked out by his
own fist, as it were. This happened in
his match with Jabez White at Phila-
delphia.
That Gans was able to perform such
an astonishing feat shows what a won-
derful hitter he was. It goes without
saying that Leonard would be foolish to
attempt such a thing, as he would only
waste his strength in vain. Leonard is
not a powerfully built man and such
feats of strength are entirely beyond
him. He is effective because his judg-
ment of distance and timing is almost
perfect and he is able to plant his fists
exactly on the vital spots. He never
scores a clean knockout with one wal-
lop, as many of the other champions
were wont to do, but he gets results in
his own way and his record shows that
he has been ever more effective than
many of the one punch fighters.

COLD STORAGE EGGS
(Montreal Journal of Commerce).
A paternal government which shows
disposition to help those in distress is
very apt to find its hands full. In Can-
ada the government has co-operated
with various organizations seeking to
increase production, to get volunteers for
overseas forces, workers for munition
plants, to conserve food supplies, to eat
less, and goodness knows what not.
These movements have all been praisew-
orthy, and have achieved a large mea-
sure of success as a result of the public
ity work carried on by the government.

Now comes a naive suggestion from the
cold storage men who have been hoard-
ing eggs, that the government should
spend some thousands of dollars in an
advertising campaign to get people to sub-
stitute eggs for help for the nerve of
some people passes comprehension. The
cold storage men have been making all
kinds of money by hoarding eggs and
other food stuffs, but now when the shoe
pinches, and they are unable to dispose
of their product, as they anticipated,
they come to the government with the
very innocent suggestion that it should
carry on a publicity campaign on behalf
of these poor egg kings, and get the
people to eat eggs instead of meat.
We have no quarrel with the cold
storage man. He performs a legitimate
part in our scheme of food distribution.
We do quarrel, however, with the sel-
fishness of egg-packers or any other

group of individuals who selfishly hoard
food stuffs and then when the schemes
go astray come to the government and
suggest that they be helped out of the
hole. Instead of the government spend-
ing money in educating the people to
use more eggs we would like to see them
put a minimum price on all cold storage
goods. This would force the hoarders
of eggs to dispose of the product. After
the packing house investigation, which
showed the Wm. Davis Company mak-
ing 80 per cent. in a single year, the
other men dealing in food stuffs and
operating cold storage plants are not apt
to get very much sympathy from the
people of the country. We would sug-
gest to these egg packers who have been
caught with an over-supply of hen-fruit
on their hands, that they should take
leaf from the Chinese method of keep-
ing eggs, and hold them for many years,
and then ship them to China, where stale
eggs are regarded as a delicacy. Cer-
tainly they are not apt to get very much
sympathy or encouragement from the
Canadian people, who are now paying
sixty cents a dozen for cold storage eggs
and anywhere from seventy-five to
eighty cents for strictly new laid eggs.
A cold storage man who is getting five
cents apiece for his eggs is not deserving
of very much sympathy.

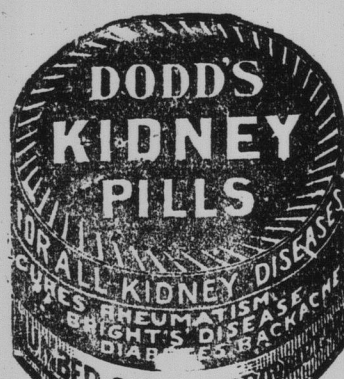
