Petrograd, April 8—The advance of the Russians in the Carpathians has cut the Austrian army under General Boerovitch, in two places. The eastern wing is in a precarious position.

The Russians have captured Smolnik, east of Lupkow Pass. The Russians have also thrown back the Austrians in the district of Bartfeld and in the district of Lupkow. Having advanced through the Rostock Pass, they have forced a wedge between the Austrian armies.

Smolnik controls the only road through the Beskid mountains between Mezolaborcs and Uzsok, a distance of sixty miles.
