SERIOUS FIRE IN TIGNISH, P. E. I.

Three Business Houses Destroyed With Loss Estimated at \$10,000

Charlottetown, P. E. I., April 8.—Fire in Tignish this morning destroyed the Tignish Trading Company's general store, loss \$8,000; J. E. Gallant's drug store, \$2,000; J. H. Myrick's tailor shop and furniture store, \$8,000. The fire started at 7:30 in the first named store, from a stove pipe. A large portion of the contents of the buildings were saved. The losses are partially covered by insurance.

IT WAS MURDER

London, April 8.—The official information bureau today issued a statement saying that the British steamer Falaba, sunk at sea March 28 by a German submarine with a loss of more than 100 lives, was not armed, and it is not true, the statement goes on, that sufficient ten inches on each side of the door was at least forty-two inches wide.

BELGIANS DRIVE ENEMY FROM WEST SIDE OF THE CANAL

London, April 8.—The Belgian legion here has a telegram from the Belgian command in the west, dated yesterday, as follows: "The western side of the Ypres canal, in the direction of the Dred Grachten, has been completely freed of the enemy by Belgian troops. The Germans fled in disorder, leaving machine guns and ammunition."

BRITISH MINING MEN IN MEXICO MAKE A PROTEST TO AMBASSADOR

El Paso, Texas, April 8.—British mining men of the Durango district today sent to Sir Cecil Spring Rice, British ambassador, a protest against an amendment to the Mexican mining law recently adopted by the Villa government. The mining men asserted that it would be impossible to comply with the law, which requires that all properties shall be worked continually with government concession as a penalty if such work is not performed. The American mine owners already have protested.

BIG SALE OF TIMBER LAND IN YORK COUNTY

Fredericton, N. B., April 8.—Eight lots of timber land aggregating 5,268 acres in Stanley and Douglas were sold under foreclosure here today at suit of J. Howard Richards vs. Margaret King, Ux. King, William Turnbull and others. The property was sold to R. W. McCallan for \$10,500 or about \$2 an acre.

VILLA'S SUPPORTERS SAY DECISIVE BLOW HAS BEEN STRUCK AT CARRANZA

El Paso, Texas, April 8.—By the defeat of General Obregon's army in the last two days in Central Mexico, officials of the Villa faction declared today that a decisive blow had been struck at the Carranza cause. Reports to the Villa headquarters said Obregon's force was retreating southward with Villa directing the pursuit.

TO DEFAIME LA BRIERE; PLAN FOR ELECTION

Indication Given in Pamphlet Read By Sir Wilfrid in Commons Today

Ottawa, Ont., April 8.—The government is preparing for an election. The kind of campaign it proposes to run was revealed in the Commons this morning. It is going to be a public battle, and the loyalty of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who sent Canadian troops to South Africa, who gave the British precedence and who has called upon his compatriots in Quebec to enlist in contingents now at the front or going there.

He called upon Hon. T. Chase to call a meeting in Montreal to urge French-Canadians to enlist.

Sir Wilfrid brought the matter up. He read from a pamphlet issued by the government publicly bureau entitled "Laurier and Quebec," and defaming him.

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Sir Robert Borden said this sort of thing was not confined to one side.
