U. S. TO SEEK LIQUOR PACT WITH CANADA

Agreement Barring Shipments From Nova Scotia Wanted

PAUL, SMITH'S, N.Y., Aug. 18.—Gen. Andrews, chief of the United States prohibition forces, who recently negotiated an agreement with Great Britain, designed to prevent the smuggling of liquor into the United States through the medium of British ships, may come to Canada with the purpose of arranging a similar agreement with that country. This will be aimed directly against the liquor which comes by vessels from Nova Scotia and from border points.

It was reliably stated here today that Secretary of State Kellogg had been requested by General Andrews to arrange through the United States consulate-general at Ottawa for a conference with the Canadian Minister of Customs with a view to negotiating an understanding with respect to the registration of vessels and other matters incident to the illicit liquor trade.

SAYS OVERTURES MADE TO LIBERALS

King Says Forke Might Have Been Called on by Gov. Gen.

BRANDON, Man., Aug. 19.—In the adjoining constituencies of Portage and Brandon, which returned Right Hon. Arthur Meighen and Robt. Forke to Parliament last year, Right Hon. Macdougall held meetings yesterday. At the outset of the Brandon meeting with Mr. Forke on the platform, Mr. King made "a public acknowledgment of the constant, loyal and unfailing support of the members of the Progressive party in carrying on the work of Parliament."
It might have been possible for the Liberals and Conservatives to co-operate, "and it was not due to the fact that overtures were not made," said Mr. King. Overtures had been made to members of the Liberal party. Mr. King declared that it had been said that in the interests of Eastern Canada, the two old parties should "join and see that these farmers from the west were not put in the position of dictators."
As to the loss of certain legislation, Mr. King declared that he had no intention of closing the door of parliament until the work of the session was concluded.
