DIRECTOR OF FEDERAL DEPT. MEETS BOARD

Says Plant Is The Equal Of Large Toronto Structure

WILL USE HYDRO

A. J. Crawford Explains Scope Of Work And Details Of Classes

THAT the local Vocational training school building, when completed, would be second to none in the Dominion, equalling even the modern and up-to-date Riverdale School in Ottawa, and that no training school of this kind could stand alone, but must work hand in hand with the industries about it, were among statements made to the Saint John Vocational Training School Board by A. J. Crawford, director of technical education under the Federal Department of Labor, who had a round table talk with the members of the local board this morning.

Mr. Crawford stated emphatically that from his own personal observations while in Saint John there was no doubt but that the school would be a success, adding that he looked for it to reach a high standard.

He explained fully to the committee details in connection with carrying out the work of the school, what it stood for, the benefits derived and also gave valuable information as to how the initial steps should be undertaken. He was cordially thanked by the board for the interest he had shown and for the information handed out.

The board is under arrest for the lighting and electric power in the new building to the Civic House Commission.

Dr. L. M. Curran, chairman, president and those present were Thomas Nagle, E. R. W. Ingraham, Alex. Wilson, John McKinnon, T. H. Carter, A. Gordon Leavitt, secretary, and S. A. Worrell, superintendent of city schools, besides Mr. Crawford and Fletcher Peacock, provincial director of vocational training.

BAXTER HELPS. It was announced that as a result of a conference between Premier Baxter and Messrs. Crawford and Peacock this morning previous to the meeting, the Premier showed keen sympathy with the work and gave permission for Mr. Peacock to relinquish his provincial post and give his full time and energy to the local school. Mr. Peacock will continue to carry on the two-fold duties for about a month before taking up his work exclusively in Saint John.

An informal talk on vocational training was given the board by Mr. Crawford in regard to securing equipment, information as to best methods to adopt the facilities at hand and what work was necessary in the matter of organization.

BOY PROBLEM. Mr. Crawford first took up the boy problem as it related to vocational training. Those to whom the school would work an advantage were usually those who had no intention of going to high school or to college. The school would provide an academic training for about a month before they entered in the commercial or industrial world which would be best suited for them.

The commercial department, Mr. Crawford said, did not mean the turning out of book-keepers and stenographers. It means more. Usually the boy who took a course of three or four months in a business college lacked vocational training along other lines. Vocational training schools were designed to provide candidates for the wider field of commercial endeavor.
