Tyler Is Better.
Chicago, Jan. 22.—The services of Geo. Tyler, star left-handed pitcher of the Chicago Nationals, have been saved from rough extraction of nearly all his teeth throughout last season Tyler was on a sick list, pains in his shoulder and neck rendering his mound work ineffective. Specialists found him almost a perfect physical specimen, but advised that he have nearly all his teeth extracted. Tyler returned to his home at Boston and soon had all his "sick teeth" pulled.

A letter to President Veck announced that the old pains have disappeared and that there seems no reason why the pitcher should not be able to take his regular turn on the mound next season. Alexander, Vaughn and Hen-

drix will accompany Tyler to Hot Springs to prepare for the regular training season.
SKATING.
Championships for Winnipeg. Montreal Star: Ald. Louis Rubenstein, secretary of the Amateur Skating Association of Canada, and chairman of the registration board of the International Skating Union of America, announces that the Canadian championships for the quarter, half, one, two, three and five-mile races to Winnipeg, Manitoba. This is due partly to the fact that many promising skaters have developed in the west of late, which is worthy of encouragement and partly to the energetic work of A. B. Morrison, secretary of the Manitoba branch of the Amateur Skating Union, with offices in the board of trade. Mr. Morrison has tried for months to get this sanction, and has made the very generous offer on behalf of his association of paying the hotel and traveling expenses of one skater representing the Toronto district, and one skater representing the Montreal district. It has been decided that the executive committee of the Skating Association will hold a meeting here to select the best all-around man to be sent from this district, while the representative of the association in Toronto will be asked to do the same thing there. The races will be held in Winnipeg on the 17th of February.

The Amherst News says: White Sox, a speedy little American mare that put the Fenwick brothers of Sussex on the racing map in 1918, has been sold to parties in Summerside, L. A. Fenwick informed the News that the purchase price was \$2,750. Considering that the original price was only \$2,800, the Fenwicks have lost nothing by this transaction. Incidentally the Fenwicks may possibly sell Lake Be Sure. At the present time negotiations for this sale are underway with parties in Quebec. However, they have some new talent in sight, and L. A. Fenwick now has a two and a half year old colt that was purchased at a recent Old Glory sale. He is ready to match this colt for a quarter of a mile, best three out of five heats, at \$200 a side, against anything on any track in the maritime provinces.

FIGHTER SHOT
IN N. Y. CABARET

Willie Lewis, Former Middleweight, Gets Three Bullets and Condition is Critical.

New York, Jan. 26.—Willie Lewis, former middleweight pugilist, accredited with having brought Georges Carpentier to the fore, was shot three times by an unknown man in a cabaret here last night. He was taken to a hospital where he is in a critical condition. Lewis was wounded in the left side, left leg and left groin. He was in a telephone booth at the time of the shooting. His assailant and another man who acted as lookout escaped. The motive for the shooting could not be learned by the police.

Lewis engaged in many bouts in Paris and England. He was defeated by Carpentier in 1912. His last important bout was at Havana in 1915 when he was knocked out by Young Ahearn.

MORNING NEWS

OVER THE WIRES

Seven passengers, mostly immigrants for Western Canada, were killed in a collision between two passenger trains on the C. P. R. near North Bay, Ontario, early yesterday morning. Two trains were running at a short interval between them. The head train became stalled and the other ran into it.

The New York Sun and the New York Herald will be issued next month as The Sun and New York Herald by their latest purchaser, Frank Munsey. Two fires in Craig street, west, Montreal, yesterday, did damage amounting to \$50,000.

At a banquet in Kingston, Ont., on Saturday, in honor of Sir Arthur Currie, he gave an address in which he lauded the work of the Canadian private in the war and asked for a continuance of the good feeling which had existed in France between officer and private for the better of home affairs. He said he was determined that the overseas forces should be perpetuated in the active militia of Canada. He made the announcement that Major General V. A. S. Williams had been awarded the C. M. G. Montreal reports that threats are heard there of the diversion of some steamers to ports other than St. John's unless the agitation at this port is relieved. Action is asked for there on the matter of commission for the St. John harbor.

A report from Siberia says that seven American engineers, and some nurses and members of the Red Cross have been captured by the Bolsheviks at Kiliushinskaya.

Hon. Hugu Guthrie was sworn in as minister of defence for Canada on Saturday, but will still continue to act as solicitor general. During Hon. Mr. Reid's health-taking trip in the south Hon. N. W. Howells will preside over public works and Hon. J. A. Calder over railways and canals besides his own duties as minister of immigration. Without reckoning the stop gap made in the filling of some appointments, the only vacancy now existing is that of public works.

Jesse Pomeroy who has served over forty years in prison in solitary confinement, has been given the privilege of reading his own poems in the prison show. He has made twelve unsuccessful attempts to escape and after the final attempt which was frustrated, he started to write poems and these he will be allowed to read.

TWO INTERESTING LECTURES LAST NIGHT.

Before a large gathering in the Y. M. C. I. last night Hugh F. Hamilton of Moncton gave an instructive address on Rev. Father Damien, the priest martyr who sacrificed his life to work among the lepers of Molokai Island. He gave the story of Father Damien's life from his studies at Louvain University, Belgium, his volunteering for service in the Sandwich Islands in the colony of 1,600 lepers which was there, at the age of twenty-three years, and his slaving in their interests until his death in 1889 at the age of fifty. For the last few years of his life he had suffered from leprosy himself but had continued his noble work.

J. E. O'Toole presided at the lecture and a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the speaker. Prior to the address Miss Katherine Gullivan sang two solos very sweetly.

Frank J. Hogan was the speaker at a lecture in St. Peter's church chapel yesterday afternoon on "Present day civilization, the disease and the cure." A large audience thoroughly appreciated the discourse which dealt with modern conditions in the world of society and
