CZECHO-SLOVAKS AT HOME ARE COLLECTING RIFLES. Czecho-Slovak peasants have created consternation among their German rulers by demanding firearms in exchange for the foodstuffs and produce which they are unable to procure elsewhere.

Writing in the Reichsberger Zeitung, the German Deputy Harzel complains bitterly of the new habit of the Czecho-Slovak "I received Premier Seydler of the enormous sugar which has been sent me from this," he says. "Furthermore, I presented to him a written report, citing and describing specific cases of the said practice. In concluding my report, I said: 'It is a fact that the Czecho-Slovak agents are procuring firearms, arms, and are thus depriving us of them.'"

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
