TAFT DEFENDS HIS COURSE

Baltimore, Jan. 25.—President Taft, speaking tonight at the annual banquet of the Merchants and Manufacturers' Association, defended the administration's attitude in the Panama canal disagreement with England, declared that his position was not unparliamentary and dishonorable, and said that there was no reason for anyone to oppose the proposal for arbitration by an impartial tribunal.

"Whether you call it a subsidy or not, I am in favor of making the transportation rates between the coasts through the Panama canal lower," said the president.

"Now the question is, can we do that under our international obligations? I think we can, and if you read the authorities I think you will find me right. But if we are bound not to except concessive vessels we can agree to submit the question to an impartial tribunal. I am willing to admit there are arguments on the other side. We are willing, however, to submit our views to arbitration. There is nothing in the attitude of the administration, as I have stated it, to show that we will be dishonorable. There is nothing to show a disposition to evade, and we are willing to rest our case with a tribunal that is impartial."

MINISTER FLEES FROM CHARGES OF DESERTION

Leaves Hurdly When Confronted With Past—Think He May Escape by Way of St. John

New Bedford, Jan. 27.—The man known here as the Rev. Alfred King-Collect, pastor of the South Primitive Methodist church, and now said to be Thomas Henry King-Collect, a London Salvation Army man, who organized here a post-particular watch will be kept at Canadian ports. It is thought that the man who failed to sail from Liverpool to New York on the Mauretania last week has sailed instead for the dominion.

Meanwhile the Methodist Conference is expected to take formal action on the revelations of King-Collect's career. The officers and congregation of the church recovered from the agitation which the first reports about their pastor caused.

That King-Collect was another man in England, and that he had had a Salvation Army career which he had not told that he should, as alleged, have deserted a wife and child in Cleveland fourteen years ago and have come here and married a New Bedford girl (since dead) is the unalterable fact.

The Rev. John Mason, secretary of the Full River Methodist district committee, has called the committee to meet with the South Primitive Methodist church tomorrow afternoon to take formal action.

Instead of coming on the Mauretania, King-Collect, aware of the charges pending against him here, cancelled his second cabin booking and wrote a letter of bitter denial to Mrs. May C. Newell, his landlady and a leader in his church.

In this letter he said: "I call today into question the charges which have been made against me, and which my feet have never trod."

This is taken, by the Salvation Army people here, to mean Canada. He has never been there, so far as known, and it is regarded as a territory where he could best evade himself on account of his English associations.

If King-Collect is located in Canada, the Salvation Army, whose pride in the case has been touched, will try to have him confronted by the deserted wife, Mrs. Rose Leighton of Cleveland. Mrs. Leighton has identified a picture and handwriting of King-Collect as those of Thomas Henry King-Collect of London, the Salvation Army man who brought his family to this country and abandoned them in Cleveland.

It was planned to bring Mrs. Leighton to this city for King-Collect's return until he cancelled his passage.

ALLIES SENDING NEW NOTE TO TURKEY

London, Jan. 26.—The Balkan plenipotentiaries, who have received full powers from their respective governments, appointed a committee today to draft a note to the Turkish plenipotentiaries explaining why the peace conference must now be considered broken off. It is hoped that the draft will be ready for the approval of the full delegation Monday night. This action of the allies is part of a series of well considered moves of pressure with which the Balkan delegates hope to bring their object without resorting to the war.

The meeting today lasted for an hour and a half and the course to be followed was given earnest consideration. Two distinct views were manifested, one for the immediate rupture of the negotiations, leading to a resumption of the war and the other favoring a temporary policy in order to avoid irreversible steps. The latter course triumphed and a committee was appointed, consisting of one member from each delegation.

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Daily Hints For the Cook

STEAMED CHOCOLATE PUDDING. Cream half cup butter with 1/4 cup sugar, add two well beaten eggs and beat all until very light. Mix and stir 1/4 cup flour, one teaspoon milk, pinch of salt and add the above alternately with three-quarters cup of milk. Stir in two tablespoons cocoa or two ounces melted chocolate. Flavor with two teaspoons vanilla and steam two hours. Serve with sauce.

CHOCOLATE CREAM PIE. Take a scant pint of water and put it into your double boiler; then mix one cup of sugar with two large rounded spoons of flour and one of cocoa; add quarter teaspoon of salt, and after thoroughly mixing the dry ingredients stir them into the hot water and cook until creamy. Cover an agate pie plate with nice paste and set on a damp one of the same size in it and bake. When the cream is cool, add vanilla to taste, and fill shell. Cover with whipped cream and sprinkle with chopped nuts.
