EXPORT OF DRUMMOND ORE
North Shore Leader.
Steamer Harold sailed on Wednesday morning about 3 o'clock from the pier of the Canada Iron Corporation here, in carrying the season's exportation of iron ore from the Drummond Mine. The steamer was due on Friday from Baltimore, but arrived here on Monday afternoon. Captain Berg was in command. The Harold will go to Delaware River, returning in about fifteen days for another shipment. The exportation on Wednesday comprised 4,800 tons. About 1,000 were loaded an hour. Engineer W. E. C. Parsons was here on Tuesday and went to the docks with Mr. Grimmer. Quite a number visited the terminals and watched the loading of the steamer. Trainloads of iron ore are arriving from the mines, 1,000 tons coming each day. The development is being vigorously prosecuted at the Bathurst mine.
