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THE COMMON COUNCIL.

Mayor Lockhart presided at the meeting of the Common Council yesterday.

The returns of Harbor commission election showed 1273 votes for and 2066 against; that makes for 3339 for their services if upon committees with the recorder they find that they are entitled to that they have authority to order the payment of the account of Cusack & McGorrie for building retaining wall on Sheriff street, \$469.77, if they find it correct; that they are authorized to deduct taxes from civic officials pay and that accounts of individuals against the city be presented to the council on account of taxes;

That Chas. A. Everett, one of the union commissioners be paid \$500 for travelling expenses, the governor-in-council having fixed his expenses at that figure.

The report was adopted with several exceptions, viz: It was ordered that E. R. Gregory be paid \$275.4 in lieu of claims against the city in connection with certain cases before the supreme court, and that the bills of Messrs. Duffield & Co. and Green be paid.

It was also recommended that the tender of T. Cusack for grading St. John street, west, be accepted for \$2,975, and also the tender for \$2.25 per cubic foot for hauling retaining wall; that the sewer on Rockland road be extended, the cost being estimated at \$1,200, that an extension of the sewer on Douglas road be made to cost \$1,200; that the water be extended from Metcalf to Bridge via Albert and certain streets, the estimated cost being \$3,000; that a sewer be put down on Ludlow street, west side, to cost \$470; that notice be given under act 22 Vic. Cap. 27 of intention to issue debentures in the amount of \$6,000 to pay for expenditures, including sewerage.
