Abraham Davis, aged 65 years, a resident of Port Union, passed away at Corner Brook on Saturday, April 12th.

The SS. Digby recently took to England 90,000 lbs fresh frozen salmon from the cold storage plant at St. John's.

An investment in courtesy always draws dividends.

The Besco Co. has succeeded in placing an order with Germany for 100,000 tons of ore.

An attempt will be made by the Grenfell Mission to rebuild the hospital at Northwest River this summer. The estimated cost will be \$12,000.00.

The fish exports of Iceland during 1923 were 41,918 tons of cured salt fish and 6,598 tons of uncured.

The Monroe Export Co. has just sent to the Brazilian market 3,312 drums codfish.

Two schooners have arrived at Grand Bank from the banks with 500 qts codfish each.

The price of seal fat this spring is \$4.75 per cwt, an advance of 25 cents over last year.

The men of Twillingate have landed over 3,000 seals this spring. Messrs. Ashbourne are manufacturing the seal fat into oil.

On Saturday last the Trench Mortar was taken from near the railway station and placed in front of the Public Building. Representatives from the local branch G. W. V. A., Church Lads' Brigade and Boy Scouts attended the ceremony.

Warren Govt. Defeated

ON A VOTE OF WANT OF CONFIDENCE

Following the sensation caused by the arrest of ex-Premier Squires and others on Tuesday last comes another move which will no doubt have far-reaching consequences on the future of Newfoundland.

Rumors were current during the week concerning defections from the ranks of the Government, and this gave rise to various conjectures as to what may happen when the House opened at 3 o'clock on Thursday afternoon. At 1.30 p.m. the same day Premier Warren was informed that he could not count on the support of more than 17 members of his Party.

After Speaker Winter read the Speech from the Throne, Mr. K. M. Brown moved that a Committee be appointed to Draft an Address in Reply. This was seconded by Mr. Scammell, Mr. Higgins, House Leader of the Opposition, then rose and made a few remarks concerning the Speech and other matters.

Mr. Cramm then arose and criticized the enquiry, and found fault with the Attorney-General's Dept., declaring that only a partial enquiry was held. He made the statement that Mr. Warren had just enough of an Enquiry to "get" his late leader.

The Prime Minister with mixed feelings then Addressed the House. Two courses, he said, was open to him in case of defeat. He would go to the Governor and advise a dissolution and appeal to the country. If that advice was not accepted he would resign and hand the reins of Government over to some person

Grand Master F. G. Bradley, of the L. O. A. was in town for two days this week. He gave a splendid address in the Orange Hall on Wednesday night. On Thursday night he addressed a special meeting of Orangemen in Victoria Hall, when matters of importance to Orangemen were dealt with. Mr. Bradley returned to St. John's by Friday morning's train.
