His principals in the East decided against undertaking that work just then, but three years ago Mr. Price came out and took charge of the Irondale works, associated with Homer Swaney, who was the financier of the in-

Starting with an indebtedness of about \$42,000 the Irondale works had a hard struggle. The plant was not the most modern neither, and the ores required to be experimented with in order to get the very best values out of them. Mr Swaney working against odds would eventually have come out all right it is thought.
