Restigouche and Bonaventure Convention at Campbellton.

Petition to Urge Prohibition of Opium and Alcohol Selling in Unincorporated Nations—Officers Elected.

CAMPBELLTON, July 2.—The Restigouche and Bonaventure Sunday School Association convened with the St. Andrew's Presbyterian church of Campbellton on July 1st. Among the delegates present from outside places were Miss Janie Harper, Oak Bay Mills; Miss Janie Gillette, New Richmond; Miss Mae McDavill, Flatlands; Miss Ella MacPherson, Abney; Miss Lizzie J. The first session of the association was held at 2.30 p. m. with devotional services led by Rev. Dr. Carr. Prayer was offered by Rev. Mr. Thompson. Vice-President E. W. Lewis then took charge of the meeting and appointed the following committees: Credential committee—Jas. Shearer, Mrs. Jas. Craig, Miss McKendrick. Nominating committee—W. J. Appleton, Robert McNair, D. C. Pirih, D. Bruce, Mrs. Starratt, Mrs. Sweetman, Mrs. Sutherland. Finance and audit committee—James Shearer, Robert McNair, W. R. McLellan.

Rev. Dr. Carr in a few well chosen words welcomed the convention to the church and town. Rev. Mr. Kirk of Dalhousie responded on behalf of the delegates.

The first address was made by Rev. P. J. Stackhouse, who spoke on The Responsibility of Parents to Sunday Schools. It was followed by an address on The Personal Influence of S. S. Teachers by Rev. Dr. Lang of St. Andrew's church, St. John.

The second session of the convention opened at 9.30 a. m. Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. Mr. Kirk of Dalhousie. The absence of the president Mr. Shearer took the chair. The report of the county secretary, D. C. Pirih, showed number of schools reporting 29, number of teachers 114, number of scholars 1,185. The thanks of the convention were tendered Mr. Pirih for his efficient work.

P.; vice-president, Esquimaux, Rev. J. M. Sutherland; vice-president, New Richmond, Angus Campbell; vice-president, New Carlisle, Jas. A. Shearer; principal supt., Restigouche, Miss A. B. Cameron; principal supt., Bonaventure, Mrs. H. H. Montgomery; home department, Bonaventure, Mrs. McPherson; home department, Restigouche, Mrs. Jas. Craig; temperance department, Restigouche, Mrs. A. A. Gerrard; temperance department, Bonaventure, Mrs. T. J. Caldwell; teacher training department, Bonaventure, Rev. M. J. McPherson; teacher training department, Restigouche, Rev. J. H. Kirk.

The reports from the parish vice-presidents in regard to conditions existing in the various schools were fairly satisfactory.

Mrs. Cameron brought before the convention a petition to the Imperial government in regard to the prohibition of selling opium and alcohol to all unincorporated nations. The resolution was adopted by the convention and was signed by the president and secretary. The meeting closed with prayer by Rev. Dr. Carr.

The third session of convention opened at 2.30 p. m. with the new president, Rev. P. J. Stackhouse, in the chair who thanked the association for the honor they had conferred upon him and

promised to do everything in his power to advance the work of the Sunday schools in the counties of Restigouche and Bonaventure.

After devotional services the following resolution was adopted: To Rev. J. F. McCurdy, Upper Canard, N. S.:

Rev. and Dear Sir—The Restigouche and Bonaventure Sunday School Association, assembled in convention, having heard of your noble bereavement in the loss of your beloved wife by death, tender you our heartfelt sympathies and commend you unto the gracious Father of all comfort, who forgetteth none who love and serve Him. The report of the finance and audit committee was received and adopted. The following persons were then appointed as delegates to the provincial convention: Jas. Shearer, R. H. Montgomery, Mrs. M. J. McPherson, W. R. McLellan, Wm. Currie, M. P. P., Mr. R. D. McNair, Miss M. E. McNair.

An invitation was received and accepted to meet in the next annual convention at Port Daniel. An address was then made by Rev. D. Lang, B. D., on First Things First. After the offering had been received a very interesting discussion took place on How to Make a Convention Effective After it Closes, which was participated in by Rev. Mr. Thompson, Jas. Shearer, Rev. Mr. Kirk, D. C. Pirih, Rev. D. Bruce, Mrs. Starratt, Mrs. Sweetman, Mrs. Sutherland.

The convention closed with singing God be With You Till We Meet Again.
