## THE NAMES OF FAMOUS WRITERS

It is a curious fact that two of the world's thinking are known both in history and in their works by pseudonyms. Reference is made to Plato and to Voltaire. None save close students of history or those to whose attention the fact has been called are aware that the real name of the Greek philosopher who gave to the world the teaching of Socrates and much wider deductions therefrom was Aristocles. That name has been lost in the mists of antiquity, but it was what was given to him by his father, Ariston, in the fifth century before Christ, when the greatest exponent of idealism who has largely controlled the progress of speculative thought down to the present day, was born. The name Plato, which is the Latin form of the Greek Platon, meaning broad, was bestowed on him derisively, as a nickname, on account of his broad shoulders. But he accepted it, and made it far more famous than his patronymic.

### FAMOUS FRENCH WRITER.

The French man of letters who made the name Voltaire famous in the early part of the eighteenth century bore the baptismal name of Francois Marie. He was born in 1694, it was when he was twenty-four years old, and his tragedy, "Oedipe" had been performed that he assumed the name Voltaire, which he afterward attached to all his published works. It has never been settled what was the origin of the significance of the name which young Aroust made more and more widely known by the work of his pen.

The career of the author has been summed up as follows: "As a writer Voltaire is not, perhaps, the author of a single great masterpiece, but every one of his productions, at least in prose, presents to us an unsurpassed example of clearness, perspective, and so far succeeded that many of his writings have to a certain extent become the property of the public mind. The destruction of the abuses against which they were directed."

Perhaps the most notable pen name in English literature is that of Junius, which was attached to a series of seventy-two letters to the "Public Advertiser" of London, between 1800 and 1812, and afterwards were reprinted in book form.

The intimate knowledge shown of matters supposed to be known only to those high in state led to their being attributed to a number of public men, but there is a general consensus of opinion that the author was Sir Philip Francis, who was in a position to know the real name of Charles F. Browne is seldom recalled. John Hilliers is far better known than Henry W. Shaw, the Verifier of the Certificate, and even Charles Godfrey Leland is hardly better known than Hans Breitmann.

### WIFE HANDS OVER MORE MONEY TO HELP HUSBAND

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 7.—Twenty-five thousand dollars cash is now in the hands of City Treasurer County, over the shortages in the accounts of the Canadian national exhibition. This amount was handed over this afternoon by Mrs. Leslie, wife of J. K. Leslie, late treasurer of the exhibition. The mortgage recently given on Mrs. Leslie's more than \$100,000 property was returned.

Leslie was arrested this afternoon on the charge of stealing ten thousand dollars exhibition money, but was released on bail furnished by his wife.
