

LONDON, April 16 .- Another despatch from Lord Roberts on the subject of the South African campaign; dated April 2, 1900, has been published in the Gazette. It largely concerns the transport service and says the mule transport consisted of what are called in South Africa buckwagons carrying a load of 3,500 pounds, drawn by ten mules each, with two native drivers. After mentioning the serviceable wagons made in Cape Colony and the frequent re-tiring and other wagons required, Lord Roberts said:

"Six buck wagons were imported for trial from the United States. They proved to be superior to any other pattern, of either Cape of English manufacture. The wheels were of hic-kory, the bodies of black walnut and the metal work of steel. The superiorits of these vehicles was doubtless due to the fact that mule wagons are largely used in America for the carriage of goods as well as for military trans-

port."
The best mules, Lord Roberts thinks, are the Cape mules, and the next best the Indian mules. The mortality among the oxen was greater than among the mules.
