A GAIN OF FOUR IN QUEBEC.

But Some Good Conservative Men Have Gone Under.

(Special to the Sun.) MONTREAL, Nov. 3.—Complete returns from the province of Quebec show that the conservatives gained four seats from the liberals in today's elections, and lost three held in the last parliament. Unless revised returns make a change, the Quebec representatives in the next parliament will stand: Liberals, 54; conservatives, 11. This is counting Gaspé, in which the election has yet to be held in the liberal column. At the last election there were 53 liberals and 7 conservatives returned from the province of Quebec. The seats gained by the conservatives today were: Argenteuil, where Mr. Perley defeated Mr. Christie; Beauharnois, where Mr. Bergeron redeemed the constituency; Charlevoix, where R. Forget is elected; Huntingdon, where Mr. Walsh defeated Mr. MacLaine, the old member, and L'Islet, where the conservative stand-out and bearer is elected, and Pontiac. Seats conservatives also carried Jacques Cartier, Laval, Sherbrooke, St. Antoine division of Montreal and Dorchester, which were all held by them in the last parliament. The conservative losses are: Montmorency, where Mr. Casgrain was defeated by a son of Premier Parent of Quebec; Nicolet, where Mr. Ball was defeated by Solicitor General Lemieux, and Compton, where Mr. Pope was beaten. While the Quebec conservatives also carried the seat of J. G. H. Bergeron, Mr. Forget, Mr. Perley, Mr. Walsh and Mr. Paquet of L'Islet, all able men, it has suffered a distinct loss in the defeat of Hon. T. Chase Casgrain and Rufus Pope, who were two of the leading members of the opposition, and did yeoman service for the party. Both the dominion and Quebec governments put forth their utmost efforts to defeat Casgrain and Mr. Pope, but to fight against a certain army sent into his constituency, defeat seemed inevitable. In both constituencies the machine was active and nothing was left undone to encompass the defeat of the two conservative stalwarts.

THE CHASE AFTER THE BANDITS.

THERMOPOLIS, Wyo., Nov. 3.—Sheriff Fenton of Big Horn county came in tonight from the chase after the outlaws who attempted to rob the First National Bank of Cody and killed Cashier Middaugh on last Tuesday. He had a conference with Sheriff Stough of Fremont county, and the two officers will leave again in the morning for the Bad Lands, in the vicinity of Tarry Creek, east of the Big Horn river, where Benton believes he has the outlaws surrounded. The officers will endeavor to prevent the robbers from penetrating the interior of the Bad Lands, for once inside their capture would become extremely hazardous. During the day posse patrolled the open country between Cottonwood Grass, Gooseberry and Outley Creek. A special from Cody says that Wm. F. Cody (Buffalo Bill) will not join the man hunt. He will leave tomorrow with his English and other guests for a hunt in the wilds northwest of Cody.

BERLIN, Nov. 4.—The Lokal Anzeiger's Mukden correspondent claims the most trustworthy authority for the statement that 34,000 sick or wounded Russian soldiers were sent away after the last engagement. The Tagesspiegel correspondent with the Russian positions on the Shalke river are daily becoming stronger. The possibility of a Japanese attack, he adds, is constantly diminishing and many experts do not anticipate an engagement before spring.
