## CLARKE INDICTED ON FIRST COUNT

The Grand Jury Found True Bill Against Him for Stealing Cash from Bank of N. B.

The January sittings of the circuit court opened yesterday morning at 11 o'clock with Mr. Justice Barry presiding. Attorney General Grimmer appeared for the Crown, and a goodly array of legal talent was present. The grand jury in the case of the King vs. Harry B. Clarke after being out for an hour and a quarter, returned a true bill on the first count, and no bill on the second.

The civil docket in light, there being no jury cases. The court adjourned until this morning at 10 o'clock when the Clarke case will be taken up. Shortly after the court opened his honor changed the grand jury. He said in part: Mr. Foreman and gentlemen of the grand jury: I congratulate you on your large attendance. It is an unusual occurrence to see such large numbers present at court.

The business before us is a consolidation of what has been handed me by the attorney general—an indictment against Harry B. Clarke. The indictment contains two counts—first, that of stealing the sum of \$2,477.77 from the Bank of New Brunswick, and second, that of stealing 100 shares of Amalgamated Copper. It will be for you to say whether the evidence regarding it shall be sufficient to bring him to trial.

His honor read the code definition of theft, and explained it. His Honor then went on to say that there was nothing in the depositions of the second count, viz., that of theft of 100 shares of stock. "The only evidence which I now find exhibited with regard to the second count is perhaps, only drawn from the letter or communication, which I hold in my hand, written by Clarke to the general manager of the bank, regarding the stock certificate mentioned in the second count, and it is with you to decide whether or not you will try the prisoner on both counts, or only on the first count, if you should consider the submitted evidence with regard to the second count insufficient to try the prisoner on."

At 11:45 the jury retired, and at sharp one o'clock returned a true bill on the first count and no bill on the second. The jury are: Edward L. Fleming, (foreman), Isaac Northrup, Frederick A. Clarke was present in court and sat by his counsel, George W. Fowler, K. C., M. P., at the baristers' table. Attorney General W. C. H. Grimmer appeared for the Crown. C. F. Sanford one of the solicitors for the Bank of New Brunswick who appeared for the prosecution at the preliminary examination, was also present. While the grand jury was out his honor stated that during this sitting of the circuit court the civil business would be conducted by Mr. Justice White, while he himself would hear the criminal business. After the hearing of the decision of the grand jury his honor stated that at the request of the attorney general the prisoner would be arraigned Wednesday morning.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

An person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader is good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years on fifty acres and erect a house worth \$500.00. W. W. CORY, Deputy of the Minister of the Interior. ## NOTICE.

Public Notice is hereby given that a bill will be presented for enactment at the next session of the provincial legislature to further amend the St. John City Assessment Act, 1909, and amending acts. The objects desired to be attained by this act are:

- (1) To provide that after the 1st day of January, 1912, the tax on buildings and improvements be reduced fifty per centum, and after such date still further reduced from time to time until the tax on such buildings and improvements disappears altogether; also that the land exclusive of buildings shall be assessed at twice the true value, to provide for the revenue lost on account of the decrease in the taxation of such buildings and improvements.
- (2) To provide that personal property be exempted from taxation as soon as circumstances will permit.
- (3) To empower the common council of the city of St. John to appoint a commission which shall become a permanent court with power to adjust as equitably as possible all difficulties which may arise on account of the change above mentioned, more particularly with reference to long renewable leases.
- (4) To provide that the five dollar poll tax be reduced to one dollar.

## Extracts from "The Saint John City Assessment Act, 1909."

"Sec. 32. The assessors shall ascertain as nearly as possible the particulars of the real estate, the personal property, and the income of any person, who has not brought in a statement in accordance with their notice and as required by this law, and shall make an estimate thereof at the true value and amount, to the best of their information and belief; and such estimate shall be conclusive upon all persons who have not filed their statements in due time, unless they can show a reasonable excuse for the omission."

"Sec. 43. No person shall have an abatement unless he has filed with the assessors the statement under oath within the time required; nor shall the Common Council, in any case, sustain an appeal from the judgment of the assessors, unless they shall be satisfied that there was good cause why the statement was not filed in due time as herein provided."


