Leaders of Labor Party Set Out to Increase Representation by an Even Hundred- Two New Publications to be Issued-Platform Aims to Improve Conditions of Labor.

The members of the party are bending their efforts to secure legislation reversing the Osborne judgment which ruled that trades unions could not devote part of their funds to the support of the labor party. It has been suggested that the party should make the support of this measure the price of their support of home rule, that an alliance should be formed between the laborites and nationalists looking to the passage of home rule and a bill to reverse this judgment.

Two labor daily papers are about to make their appearance. One, the Daily Herald, is to take the place of the Morning Leader, which is to be amaltagmated with the Daily News. The Leader was never an official labor saper to the party. The Herald will be an out and out labor sheet.

The second paper is to be the Daily Citizen, and it will be the official or gan of the party.

A fund of \$750,000 is being raised to make a start, and the party has subscribed \$30,000 towards this, and will give both financial and other support in the future. The leaders have set themselves the task of increasing the labor representations in the House of Commons from 42 to 142 and with this concrete party they believe they can dominate not only home, but also foreign politics.
