SEMI-FAMINE FOR WEEKS PAST. Lemberg, Galicia, March 22, via London.—Austrian prisoners from Przamyal, captured shortly before the garrison surrendered, say that the fortress for a long time was in a condition of semi-famine, lacking bread and other foods. Except for the horses of the Austrian officers no animal, they say, was visible in the town, all having been killed to feed the soldiers, who recently had little to eat, except conserves, which led to much typhoid and other sickness. Conditions were such, the prisoners add, that they almost led to a mutiny of the troops, who urged that the city be sur-rendered.

Bombs Dropped on Dutch Steamer

Sombs Dropped on Dutch Steamer London, Mar. 22—A Reuter des-atch from Amsterdam says that the tack by a German aeroplane on the nuch steamer Zevendergen, which rrived at Ymulden yesterday, has aused an outburst of popular feeling a Holland, but has had no effect on he movement of vessels. Fifty-one steamers of various nat-onalities have arrived or sailed from totterdam since Saturday and so far is is known only one has been attack d by a German aeroplane—the Brit-sh steamer Elfland, which had been chartered by the Belgian Relief Com-nittee. Bombs were dropped, but no lamage was done. The naval commander at Amster-lam has been instructed to investigate the attack on the Zevendergen, against which two bombs were directed with-out effect.
