

WORRIED OVER THE PROSPECT OF A COUNTER REVOLUTION

Berlin's Unstable Government Begins to Feel Very Much Afraid of Bavaria and is Also Paying Attention to the Underground Movement Looking to the Restoration of the Old Regime.

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Nottingham, Dec. 4.—According to the Berlin correspondent of the Nieuwe Rotterdamse Courant, the government is not so unconcerned as it was regarding the possibility of a counter revolution. Various generals are coming forward against the soldiers' councils and it is a significant fact that two army lieutenants who originally played a great role in the Berlin council have disappeared from the scene. The cause has not been publicly stated, but the incident is regarded as an indication of the trend of events.

While the retreat of the armies proceeds without the disturbances which both the government and the people feared, there are other things which give rise to great anxiety. The first is the shortage of coal due to miners' strikes in the Silesian and Rhenish collieries. The situation in the Silesian district is particularly serious. Efforts towards settlement have repeatedly been thwarted by interference of Polish agitators, it being found impossible to re-open factories in which a great number of demobilized men might find employment. These must now remain without work.

Another cause for uneasiness is the curious attitude of the Bavarian president, Kurt Eisner, who after having been generally regarded as a harmless idealist, is now developing into a barbarian Napoleon, ruling despotically over that country and striving after life power over the whole empire. This matter would be amusing, did it not threaten to lead to a dangerous situation. The trouble is that Eisner's programme is a strange mixture of practical and theoretical demands, although he is well aware that socialization on a large scale is at the present time impossible, because it would unhinge Germany's economic life and that immediate peace is an urgent necessity and the convocation of a constituent assembly therefore unavoidable, he still adheres to his platform which includes concessions to socialization and proletarian demands. Owing to this attitude, the policy which he regards as necessary is made impossible.

"It is worthy to note," says the Nieuwe Rotterdamse Courant correspondent, "that Eisner is like so many of his friends. While possessed of intense distrust of all political parties, he shows complete confidence in M. Clemenceau."

The Freiheit lacks stress on this feeling. "Let us say to foreign nations," it observes today, "that we wish to negotiate only on a basis of confidence. If you give us this, since we have removed the pillars of the old regime, all is well. If not, we are powerless. We will no longer negotiate by means of diplomatic technicalities and finesse. We will meet you openly and unreservedly. Have confidence in the German people. Do not prevent our final union."

icipation from that which bore you down yourselves for so many years by saying that Germany is on the way to Bolshevism. Recognize how far this statement goes towards working a counter revolution. Support this Bolshevism even though you may fear it now, and do not withhold food from us."

It is difficult to say what consequences the severance relations between Munich and Berlin may have—more so on seeing that according to the Borsen Kurier, the government intends to maintain Dr. Solz in office, though this seems hardly likely in view of the fact that the Berlin executive also demands his resignation. If Solz resigns it is certain that many political officials of Wilhelmstrasse will follow. It is doubtful however whether the government will drop Erzberger, nor is it to be expected that they will agree to the demand for the resignations of Scheidemann and Davila. Meanwhile the bickering causes growing impatience.

London, Dec. 4.—The ex-Kaiser's abdication is now a formal, definite fact, but the form thereof does not satisfy requirements here unless the actual text differs from the cable reports. The great objection lies in the fact that the document appears to concern the Kaiser only and says nothing about the other members of the royal house while its form indicates that the previously expressed intention of abdicating amounted to more temporizing with the Allies.

Much significance attaches to the simultaneous movements, apparently rapidly growing, aiming at the restoration, directly or indirectly of the old regime. At present a conference going on in Switzerland between representatives of the previously ruling groups in Austria and Germany over the Crown Prince of Bavaria is presiding, is viewed, here with grave suspicion.

The altered status of the Kaiser makes no difference however in the question of extradition. It is understood here, although it has not yet been stated officially, that all the principal allied governments agree that they are legally entitled to demand that he be given up, although most of them are now inclined to pay less attention to strict legality than to urgent political necessity. The war cabinet here will confer with French and Italian representatives on Monday next on the memorandum submitted by British law officers, who have taken the view that surrender would be required from Holland with the usual formalities of international law, but the request is based less on legal arguments than upon carefully formulated reasons pointing out the necessity of this course.

There is little reason to expect that Holland will place serious obstacles in the way. A representative Dutch view is found in the "Haarlemsche Post" of Amsterdam: "Let there be no judicial subtleties. Expel the Kaiser from the country immediately without more ado. We must not make the country an asylum for ex-criminals after the Bavarian revelations. It is a crime that the Kaiser is one of the worst criminals."

When surrendered, the Allies will place the Kaiser in a place of safety pending trial by an international court.

GRAND FALLS SPECIAL HOSPITAL CLOSES

Grand Falls, N.B., Dec. 4.—The Emergency Hospital, which was established at Grand Falls about five weeks ago to accommodate patients suffering from influenza in Victoria County, and the Parish of St. Andrew, Madawaska County, will be closed on Thursday. Too much cannot be said of the splendid manner in which the hospital has been conducted, and many tributes have been paid to the efficient staff for their efforts on behalf of those suffering from this disease.

Miss A. F. Logan, Matron of the Hospital, is deserving of untold praise for the faithful supervision. The community is greatly indebted to the other members of the nursing staff, Miss Madeline Dolan, Mary J. O'Leary and E. M. Logan. Also the V. A. D's, Miss K. Duffy, Mrs. R. White and Miss G. White. In all about forty patients were accommodated at the hospital during the past few days. Although the death rate was exceeding high in the county, but four died at the Emergency Hospital. Miss Madeline Dolan has gone on a case in Limestone, Maine.

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SAUERKRAUT MADE SOLDIERS HAPPY

Two Hundred Barrels Discovered in Luxembourg and Everybody Had a Feed.

Luxembourg, Thursday, Dec. 3.—Probably the greatest excitement since the Rainbow Division settled down at the Luxembourg border to await orders to enter Germany, involved today 200 barrels of sauerkraut.

Rainbow headquarters are located in Mersch, a good sized town where Luxembourg good-will towards the allies and bad-will towards Germany has now been proved to the last degree. Experts reported before the division had been in Mersch four hours that among other things they had discovered an enormous supply of sauerkraut which might be available for every division mess. Consequently every mess officer sent the mess sergeant every army mess in Mersch was impatiently waiting, loaded with the kraut.

"It's about sauerkraut," their spokesman announced. "Don't eat that sauerkraut." Curiously prompted the officer receiving the delegation to inquire why such a request was made since every army mess in Mersch was impatiently waiting, loaded with the kraut.

"We are here to show our good will toward the American army," the spokesman continued. "Don't eat a single bite of that kraut. It's hard to explain, but I will add that the German in occupation in Mersch this fall forced us to prepare that sauerkraut, and it is enough to say we prepared it. Further I may add that we prepared some sausage for the Germans also. It was unpalatable, but it is the sausage which is here in the sauerkraut."

Further conversation elicited the information that neither the sauerkraut nor the sausage was made by the Luxembourgers according to Hoyle. And needless to say not a bit of either was yet passed down a Rainbow Division.

KINGS COUNTY SOLDIER GIVES LIFE IN FRANCE

Kars, Dec. 3.—An official telegram from Ottawa, on November 28, tells of the death of John H. Davis of the 26th Battalion, who was killed in action on October 8 while fighting for the defence of his country. No particulars have been received except that he was not previously wounded.

Pte. Davis enlisted in October, 1917, but was not sent to the colors until January, 1918, when he joined the 26th Depot Battalion, stationed at St. John. After a few months' training at St. John and at Brampton, England, he was sent with a draft to the 26th Battalion in France where he was on active service until his company was making an attack on the town of Cambray on October 8 when the young soldier gave up his life.

Although a native of England he had lived a number of years in this country and during that time had made many friends here all of whom will hear with deep regret of his early death.

Pte. Davis was 23 years of age and is survived by one sister, Mrs. J. H. England, and three brothers, all on active service.
