BEAVERS LOSE FOUR STRAIGHT

Break Flint's Record of Six Straight Games—Pitchers Very Weak

The Beavers are still slipping. After dropping the entire series to Battle Creek they moved to Flint yesterday and received the worst drubbing of their road trip. As indicated in the last four games, the pitching staff is lamentably weak. Sharpe opened yesterday's conflict and went along in great style until the third and in the interval his teammates presented him with three runs. Sharpe couldn't stand positively, however, and permitted the Flintites to lambast him for four runs when Beatty yanked him in. In favor of George who had been playing right field. George had worked two days previous however, and the strain was too much. Flint commenced a fusillade in the fifth frame and made six complete circuits before the third out was registered. In all the home team garnered fifteen hits for a total of twenty five bases and played errorless ball. Manager Beatty is burning up the wires in quest of additional men for the pitching staff and expects to have his team out of the rut in a very short time.

Flint Mich. May 28.—After losing six in a row, Flint broke their losing streak to-day by walloping Kitchener 12 to 6. The locals hit both Sharpe and George freely putting across four runs in the third inning and six in the fifth, a ter the visitors had gotten away with a three run lead. Flint added two more in the closing rounds and allowed Kitchener three, thereby playing sure on putouts while runs were being scored. Flint hit safely 15 times for a total of 25 bases.

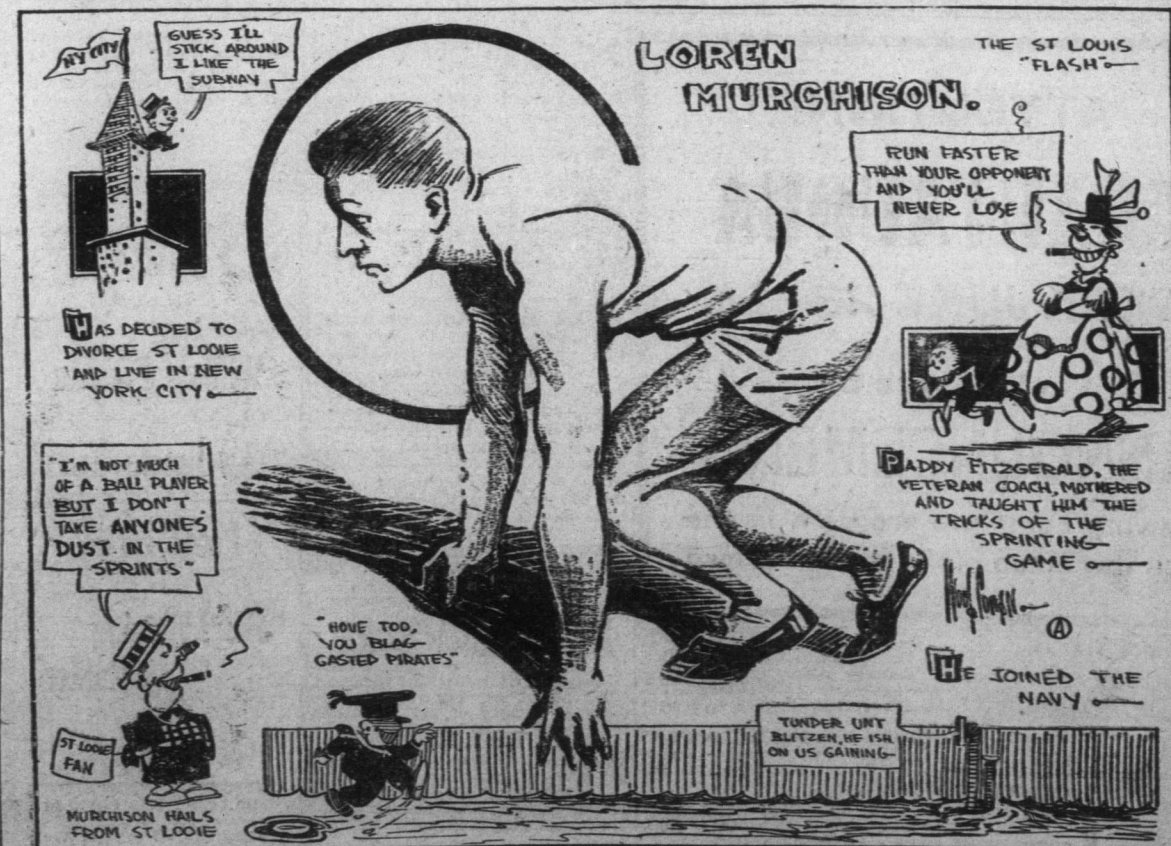
