FOOTBALL.

St. John 3 Mount Allison 0

A large and enthusiastic crowd gathered on the Shamrock grounds, St. John, Saturday afternoon to witness the football match between St. John and Mount Allison. The St. John team won with a score of 3-0.

Mr. Allison announced through the press that their St. John Frederickton trip was to be a scapling expedition if such is the case it is to be hoped that City and U. N. B. teams keep off the grass. No scapling trips for our boys, as playing two games and having 9 points scored against you and not scoring any yourself is not the best record ever made by 15 healthy looking football players who have plenty of time to practice. St. John did well to get a team together on such short notice. Captain Jordan and Billy Malcolm of the U. N. B., played their usual strong game again and proved a tower of strength on the St. John half line.

Immediately after the game between St. John and Mount Allison, teams representing the Y. M. C. A. and Rotheray College lined up. The game was one of the fastest of the season, and both teams showed the results of much good practice since their last game. The game ended in favor of Rotheray by a score of 0-3.

The St. Joseph's team from Memramcook will play the victors in Friday's game on the U. N. B. athletic field and should prove a high class drawing card. Although beaten by Mount Allison early in the season the team seems to be a stronger aggregation at the present time, as they have improved wonderfully. The U. N. B. 1903 team is the best turned out on the hill for years, having won two games already from teams that have annually had a snap with the College teams. Last Friday's game showed them in close, heavy tackling play and, needless to say, the boys have got them both masters. Thursday's game will commence at 3:30 o'clock and should prove to be one of the best ever played.

Had Mr. Allison played the intermediate team in St. John, with whom it was said they endeavored to arrange a game, their "scapling expedition" would have been more successful as a "scapling expedition."

FATAL COLLISION.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 31.—Fifteen persons were killed and more than fifty injured, some fatally, this morning by a collision between a special passenger train on the Big Four railroad and a freight engine with a cut of coal cars. The accident happened on the outskirts of the city. The passenger train of thirteen coaches was carrying 945 persons, nearly all of whom were students of Purdue University and their friends on the way from Lafayette to Indianapolis for the annual football game.
