

FATAL COLLISION.

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 31.—Fifteen persons were killed and more than fifty injured, some fatally, this morning by a collision between a special passenger train on the Big Four railroad and a freight engine with a cut of coal cars. The accident happened on the outskirts of the city. The passenger train of thirteen coaches was carrying 945 persons, nearly all of whom were students of Purdue University and their friends on the way from Lafayette to Indianapolis for the annual football game.
