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A LAUGHABLE SCENE.
Amusing Examination of the Ex-Pro-
prietor of the Inebriety.
OTTAWA, May 19.—One of the most
amusing scenes ever witnessed in a par-
liamentary committee took place this
morning, when Mrs. Peter Grant, of Dal-
housie, was examined in reference to
the Inebriety hotel scandal. Mrs. Grant,
it will be remembered, was the owner of
the hotel before Mr. Schriber obtained
possession of it by promising her husband
a situation on the Intercolonial railway.
The witness began this morning by pro-
testing against being obliged to answer
any questions. She had no faith what-
ever in politicians. Here Sir Richard
Cartwright said he wished it to be noted
that this lady's sympathies were with
the ministerial party, and that she could
only speak of politicians as her own side
(great laughter). In answer to questions
put by Mr. Davies, Mrs. Grant said that
she did apply to the government to air
her in her private enterprise, and that
she had a perfect right to do so. When
that what everybody came to Ottawa for
(cheers). She never got anything from
Sir Chas. Tupper but verbal promises.
Being questioned in regard to the docu-
ment that was given her on behalf of Mr.
Schriber, promising her husband a situa-
tion if she would give up the hotel, Mrs.
Grant said she had brought it to Ottawa,
but would not produce it. "It is a fun-
damental principle of British law," cried
the buxom lady, "that a wife is not to
give evidence against her husband."
Being asked by the chairman what she
meant by the statement that she must
answer the question and produce the
document, she persisted in her refusal,
and a number of scenes ensued. Mr. Davies
sought to prove the contents of the docu-
ment by asking questions, when Mr. Tupper
interfered, arousing a suspicion that
he feared his "governor" might be com-
promised by the answers. The young
gentleman contended that some of Mr.
Davies' questions were unfair. The wit-
ness was then asked whether she had been
instructed by anyone or advised as to the
answers she was to give to questions, and
Mr. Tupper again objected. Mr. Mulock
said that Mr. Tupper was encouraging
the witness in her refusal to answer pro-
per questions, and Sir Richard Cartwright
said the proceedings were farcical. After
a great deal of cross-firing Mrs. Grant
said she would go to the dungeon before
she would produce the document, but
afterwards relented and promised to pro-
duce it to-morrow. She denied being per-
sonally acquainted with Mr. Schriber
and then Mr. Mulock, out of mischief,
asked if she was acquainted with Mr.
Townshend, M. P. Mr. Townshend rose
blushing to the eyes, to explain that he
only met the witness to-day, but the
cheers and laughter that greeted him
drowned his remarks. The last scene
was when Mrs. Grant went to the chair-
man (Mr. Rykert) and, putting her arms
around his neck, began to whisper in his
ear. (Cries of "Cheer!") Mr. Rykert tried
in vain to extricate himself, but only did
so after the loving witness had told him
she would send the required document to
him this afternoon.

ROYAL BIRTH AT MADRID.
A Posthumous Birth to the Spanish
Queen Yesterday.
MADRID, May 18.—Queen Christina
gave birth to a son yesterday at noon.
In response to a summons there had as-
sembled at the palace to wait the
accouchement, all the cabinet ministers,
the principal civil and military magnates,
a detachment of members of the Cortes,
and other distinguished persons. Both
mother and son are doing well. The
usual pomp and ceremony were observed
in connection with the birth which
feminist readers may remember in the light
of the nineteenth century. The utmost
preciseness of detail is laid down for
such occasions. When the child was
born the cananera-major at once de-
scended the steps to the present of
council, who informed the captain gen-
eral of Madrid and the commander of
the Halberdiers, so that the proper
signals might be given which announce
the fact to the populace of Madrid. The
child being a prince the Spanish stand-
ard was run up over the palace and
a salvo of twenty-one guns fired. Had it
been a princess the flag would have been
white and the number of guns eighteen,
and had the birth been at night, lan-
terns would have been hoisted, red or
white, according to the sex of the infant.
Upon the hoisting of the flag yesterday,
all the persons mentioned in the de-
cree crowded into the salon. In an outer
room were convened all the ministers of
state, the diplomatic corps, grandees,
knights of the golden fleece, military and
naval commandants, the prefect of Ma-
rid, the archbishop of Toledo, and the
clergy of the cathedral, etc. The can-
nara took the newly born child, placed
it on a cushion on an enormous silver
salver, and carried it out herself from
the Royal bedroom, and presented it to
all the guests in turn, beginning with
the members of the diplomatic corps,
the president of council standing at her
side all the time. After this ceremony
the infant was restored to its mother,
and the minister of justice registered the
birth.
