CHIPMAN, WILLIAM HENRY. [*Kings.*] L.

Family originally came from Eng. during the old times of persecution, and settled in the old New Eng. States; at the termination of the Am. revolution, Ward Chipman, formerly of Mass., a graduate of Harvard University, and who held the office of Deputy muster-master general of the loyalist forces in the revolted Colonies; settled in N. B., and founded a branch of the family there; he subsequently became Chief Justice and President of that Province. (See *Sabine*.) Another branch was founded in N. S. by Handley Chipman, who proceeded there before the close of the war. S. of the late Rev. Wm. Chipman, a Baptist minister, by Mary Dickey; and grands. of the late Wm.
