Board-teacher talks bog down

Talks between the Peel Board of Education and representatives for its 1,600 high school teachers are at a standstill.

A letter, dated Dec. 18, was sent by the teachers' four table-team members requesting a meeting with the board.

While OSSTF district 10 president George Webster says they are still waiting for a reply to the letter from the board, board vice-chairman Ruth Thompson says the board has responded, indicating it would be willing to meet with the teacher representatives.

"We added, however, that we would like some indication of the intent of the meeting and an agenda," says Mrs.

Thompson, salary committee chairman.

"As far as I know, our response was hand delivered about Dec. 22, so right now it's up to the teachers to come back to us."

Mrs. Thompson hopes the meeting will focus on a two-year contract for the teachers, but added, there would probably be areas of change due to the province's recent decision to restrict grants to local boards and lift ceilings.

"The board has to find the money somewhere now and it's my personal opinion that much of that money can be found in the contract," she says.

The board's last offer, rejected on Dec. 11 by 70 per cent of Peel teachers who voted, represented a 33.4 per

cent wage increase, at a cost of \$30,855,623 to the board.

"Unless we do something to that contract, I agree with Dr. Humphreys that the local taxpayers may find their education taxes increased up to \$175," Mrs. Thompson says.

Dr. Ted Humphreys, chairman of the board, told The Times that the board

would look into ways to offset such an "unpalatable" increase.

"Something has to go, either teachers' salaries or staffing. The board has to re-examine that offer and administration should be rigorous in cutting costs," he says.

Teen returned to face trial

A Mississauga youth has been arrested in Montreal and returned here to face trial on a charge of breaking and entering a service station.

The Fieldgate Shell station at 1715 Bloor St. E. was broken into during the early morning hours of New Year's Day. About \$1,000 in credit-card receipts and \$450 in cash was stolen.

After investigation, police obtained an arrest warrant for

Hans Klaffke, 17, of 3515 Havenwood Dr. in connection with the break-in.

Klaffke was arrested by Montreal police the following day and returned to custody in Mississauga on Jan. 3 by Peel Detective Doug Fritz. He is being held in custody to await a bail hearing.

Police are seeking a second man in connection with the break-in.

Councillors get committee posts

Members of city council's 1976 standing committees were named Monday.

On the planning committee are councillors Mary Helen Spence, Ron Searle, Hazel McCallion, Hubert Wolf and Frank McKechnie. McKechnie replaces Ward 6's David Culham on the group.

The name of the civic government committee was changed to the administration and finance committee. That's what it was called in 1973. On that committee: councillors Caye Killaby, Chic Murray, Mary Helen Spence, David Culham and Hazel McCallion.

On the recreation committee are councillors McKechnie, Searle, Wolf and Harold Kennedy, and on the physical services committee,

Kennedy, Culham, Killaby and Murray.

The chairman and vice-chairman of each committee will be named by the individual committees at their first meetings.

The Metro Toronto and Region Conservation Authority will have three Mississauga members: Mayor Martin Dobkin and Searle and McKechnie. Searle replaces David Culham on that group.

Named to the city's condominium committee are Culham and McKechnie.

Citizen representative Ron McKenzie of Meadowvale was named to the administration and finance committee, and George Johnson of Port Credit to the recreation, advisory committee.

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
