Festival of Tables enacted at church

The Festival of Tables was presented in Streetsville's Trinity Anglican Church last week by seven members of Toronto's B'nai B'rith organization. The Jewish women were guests of the Trinity Anglican Church Women and their presentation was aimed at increasing an understanding of Judaism, not only among Jewish people, but also among other faiths. There was representation at the gathering from many of Streetsville's churches.

Gloria Clamen was commentator for the festival and was assisted by Brenda Caplan, Dorothy Fishbayn, Terri Lipton, Bunny Goodman, Beryl Paradisgarten and Toba Diamond whose vocal rendition of the music parts of the presentation was much appreciated. She accompanied herself on the piano.

Five main Jewish festivals were portrayed by the tables, each of which was set up as it would be in a Jewish home for the special occasion, complete to the special decorations used and the traditional foods eaten. It was explained that the centre of Judaism is the family and home and that Jews regard the home as a most fitting place for worship since theirs is essentially a family religion. At each table the mother of the family would light symbolic candles, first covering her head with a kerchief since no act of worship is ever performed by any Jew, male or female with head bared. The father blesses his children at the table and there are many happy rituals surrounding the various holidays, which were described to the watchers.

Festivals "observed" were the Sabbath with its proper preparation; Rosh Hashana, the Jewish New Year and Feast of Dedication; Succot (or Sukkoth as it was termed in older times) which is the

Feast of Tabernacles; Chanukah (Hanukkah), the festival of lights; and the Passover celebrating the Jews' deliverance from bondage in Egypt.

This festival of tables program was instituted by the B'nai B'rith women about 10 years ago. B'nai B'rith is the oldest and largest service organization in the world, the audience was told. In Toronto alone there are 18 chapters with a combined membership of 1,500. Members are active in many charity enterprises from meals on wheels for oldsters, manning Ontario Hospital canteens, working with the retarded, canvassing for major appeals, reading to the blind at the C.N.I.B.

Following the demonstration, the audience sampled the traditional festival fare — unleavened bread, honey and potato cakes, various loaves and different wines, all of whose significance had been explained. Anglican Church Women's President Marie Nuttal welcomed the guests, who had been introduced by Grace Adams, and then later presented the B'nai B'rith women with a gift of money to assist in their work.
