

THIS is an age when the player holds a higher place in the estimation of the public than in Shakespeare's day—and that period was more favorable to the stage than some which followed it.

The publishers have not been enabled to issue this book as soon as was intended. The principal reason therefor was that some of the theatres are not in a position to know what bookings they will have for the bulk of the season before they are fairly well started on the opening period. However, this brings the publication of "Toronto Theatres" to a time when it may justly be regarded as a pre-holiday offering. And the patrons who have rendered it possible to make its distribution gratuitous will, we trust, reap additional benefit from its entrance at the psychological moment when the audience's heart is most attuned to catch the overture that sounds the note of holiday and winter trade.
