For more than 25 years he ha served as secretary-treasurer of the Quinte Cheese Company and in that capacity gave the same thorough care and attention to his work as he did in all other public duties.

Although reared in the Conserva tive political faith Mr. Anderson was of too sturdy a character to be held submissively by the shackles of any party organisation. He did his own M. Gallagher's class at St. Anthinking and formed his own conclusions upon public questions as they arose. In politics he was an independent but by no means a neutral.

In religion he was associated with the Methodist church and he was also a member of Belleville Lodge. No. 81, I.O.O.F. and of Lake Lodge A. F. and A. M.

Capt. Anderson was the author of those vigorous, interesting and outspoken letters and comments appearing from time to time in The Ontario under the signature of our "Ameliasburg Correspondent" In addition to his experience as editor of The Brandon Sun, Capt Anderson was editor of The Daily Ontario for the


