Good Crop Outlook

SASKATOON, Sask., Aug. 2.—There is a good crop outlook in central and northern Saskatchewan. The field will be above the average, according to present prospects. Wheat harvesting will start in many places on August 15 and will be general by August 25. The estimated time of grain ripening will be seven to ten days earlier than in 1912, which means a lot in the average of the crop. Oats are likely to be a big crop and flax is smaller in acreage than a year ago. It is generally stated that the farmers have gone much more largely into hog raising than in any previous year and there is also a movement to go into dairying and mixed farming generally.

"POLICEWOMAN" NOT DIGNIFIED

CHICAGO, Aug. 2.—The ten women selected by Mayor Harrison for an addition to the police force should not be called "policewomen," in the opinion of members of the women party of Cook county who attended the monthly meeting to-day, after a lengthy discussion, during which the suffragists asserted that the name of "policewoman" is not suggestive of refinement, does not support the dignity of the office and is highly improper because the duties are on a higher plane than those of a mere policeman.
