### LIQUOR

### TROUBLE

#### Von's Hotel is being Charged by Chief Harwood for Alleged Infractions.

Chief Harwood has laid a charge against Von's hotel for selling spurious liquor to a minor, and also for selling liquor in larger quantities than by law a hotel is allowed to sell.

It appears that recently an assembly of men at a gathering chipped in and with a fund of one dollar sent a boy to the hotel to secure a gallon of beer. A hotel by law is not permitted to sell more than a half gallon of beer, and is not supposed to sell to a minor. The defence is that only a half gallon was sold and that the minor had an order.

The case was before the police magistrate yesterday but was adjourned for eight days to allow both the prosecution and defence time for preparation.

### IRISH MEET

#### Irishmen's Association of Regina Elect Officers for the Year—“Erin-go-bragh” their Motto—Object of Association

Over fifty members of the Irishmen's Association of Regina attended the annual meeting of the association which was held in the McCarthy hall last evening. John McCarthy, the president occupied the chair and called the meeting to order.

The constitution and bylaws were adopted and this work took up a considerable time. The objects of the association in the words of the constitution are:

"The socially bringing together of Irishmen, by birth or descent, and of promoting acquaintance and good fellowship between Irishmen."

"The perpetuating in Canada of Irish sentiment and traditions."

"The welcoming of Irish men and women arriving in Canada, and assisting them in establishing their citizenship therein."

"The protection of Irish women."

"The assisting in finding employment for the Irish unemployed."

The motto adopted by the association is "Erin-go-bragh" while orange and green sashes together are to be the association colors.

### AMENDMENT

### LOST

#### R. S. Lake Proposed that Farmers Be Given Three Years to Re-pay—Leech in Evidence.

Ottawa, Feb. 11.—In the House of Commons today while discussing the seed grain regulations, R. S. Lake, Qu'Appelle, moved that the terms of re-payment for the seed grain should be three years instead of one year. He pointed out that the season's crop of 1908 would have to bear the expenses of two seasons. This would be very burdensome especially if the crop of 1907 did not happen to be a very good one. His resolution to extend the time of re-payment to three years, however, was defeated on a vote of 58 to 98.

**R. E. A. LEECH DISTRIBUTES**  
Perhaps some of our readers have heard of R. E. A. Leech, of "The Red Line" fame, well, he has an appointment as inspector of Dominion land agencies. He has also been appointed as chief seed grain distributor for Saskatchewan and Alberta, and has arrived in Regina so late over the work of his latest commission. He has offices in the Dank block where he is getting organization work under way.

It is not expected that the distribution will commence until next month but in the meantime the grain has to be procured and the applications received and arranged.

### Nine Killed

(Montreal, Feb. 11.—An explosion of dynamite in the Standard Explosive Co.'s works near Vaudeville this afternoon killed nine men. The nitrogen building and two mixing rooms were destroyed and the men blown to pieces, their remains literally having to be collected. While the cause is not definitely known, it is believed that the dynamite was in the process of thawing. The company, which employs 200 men will rebuild immediately.

It is probable that Mrs. R. F. Chisholm will be appointed customs officer at North Battleford. This appointment will meet with the approbation of everyone who is acquainted with Mrs. Chisholm and a large number who are not.—Battleford Press.
