HAVE NO CHANCE.

British Liberals Cannot Win in This Election

And They Admit It—All Will be Over in a Few Days.

London, Sept. 22.—The political campaign has commenced in earnest.

Only another week remains before the polling begins and it will be only a little over five weeks before the new parliament assembles. That it will be a Conservative body is a foregone conclusion.

Herbert Gladstone admits that it is quite impossible for the Liberals to win over the 160 seats necessary to give them a victory.

Thus, from the outset the election is as great a rout for the Liberals as it is a triumph for the Conservatives.

Their energies to a defense of the war in South Africa, and of its management, while the Liberals attempt to ignore it, concentrating their attacks upon the failure of the Conservatives to fulfil the promises of beneficial home legislation. Though this is officially the Liberals' main plank, the division of their ranks over the war is so great that it is quite impossible to keep all the candidates in line.

Thus while Sir Edward Grey and the Right Hon. H. Asquith and others are telling the voters that it is useless to discuss the war and are admitting that the annexation of the Boer republics is the only logical result of the war, other well-known members of the party are telling them that the war was unnecessary, and that the annexation of the republics is a blot on England's fair name.

SALISBURY'S APPEAL.

Lord Salisbury's manifesto to the electors of the United Kingdom, in anticipation of the parliamentary general elections emphasizes the government's position as a strong party.

It is supported by a strong parliamentary majority, as "the only means of convincing the inhabitants of conquered South Africa of the government's hope of diverting the government from their policy by persistent resistance or agitation."

After remarking that "all the recent troubles in South Africa have been due to a shift of parliamentary opinion at a critical moment," the prime minister goes on to say:

"It will depend on the disposition and conduct of the Boers how long an interval it will take before their full position as a British colony is attained. The brilliant success of Lord Roberts' army must not blind us to the imperfections disclosed in our own defensive armor, imperfections which but for the war might have remained unnoticed. It will be the urgent duty of parliament and the government to remedy these defects, a duty which could not be discharged by a ministry depending upon a broken party."

In conclusion, Lord Salisbury refers to China as "a difficulty among other things, confronting the government and requiring that the government should be armed with a strong majority in the House of Commons."

He urges that in view of all these considerations there should be no abstentions at the polls.

IN THE HOSPITAL.

Member of the Planet Staff Tells
of a Visit to Netley

Where He Met Some of the
Wounded Canadians—No
Chathamites there.

Harry W. Anderson, of The Planet staff, writes from Southampton under date of September 12, as follows:

With delightful weather, pleasant touring and the fellowship of kind friends my holiday has been indeed a splendid one. It seems as though the last of a lifetime had been crowded into the past month as far as sight-seeing and touring are considered. My sister and myself have just returned from a charming cycling tour through the south and I am leaving to-morrow again for London. Here mother and I will spend a week at the Stead home (if uncle and I can get along without quarrelling over the war) and then I will work on towards Liverpool en route homeward. I expect to sail on or about the 27th inst. By the way, the London offices—morning papers—are in many ways a revelation, and one can gain many ideas from their evening publications. Their telegraphic staff interested me much and all seemed such capable and nice fellows. I was fortunate in securing letters of introduction to all but one.

To-day we motored to Netley, in order to visit the national army hospital there. Learning that there were many Canadians there, I thought it just possible I might stumble on a B. Company boy or two, and grind out

an interview on the doings of our Chatham fellows. My connection with The Planet, proved an "open sesame" to the hospital, a magnificent building, over a quarter of a mile in length, admirably situated, overlooking the Channel, and with magnificent surrounding grounds. There were a score or so of wounded and convalescing Canadians, with whom I had a most interesting chat. There were, however, none of B. Company's men; the only one, Capt. Stewart, having recovered and left again for the front.

In No. 29A, surgical corridor, however, I met Pte. O. Matheson, whose left leg was fractured seriously at Pardsberg. He belonged to F. Co., and while his home is in Newcastle, N. B., he hailed to the front from Chatham, N. B., and this bond of union had brought him in touch with the lads from Chatham, Ont. Matheson is well educated and a splendid talker, but very modest in reference to himself. He spoke very highly of Burrell, and paid a warm tribute to his pluck. Gortie, he said, was always bright and the life of his corps. He did not remember Wilson—there were many Wilsons—and did not even know that poor Donegan was killed. He said they received since coming to the hospital two months ago. By the way, the boys must have received their money before, as Matheson asked me "if Officer Rankin was still in Chatham."

On my reply in the affirmative, he said it was "pretty swell" of him to send the chaps that money. He wished there were a Major Rankin in the hospital. The English Tommy is nothing, if not generous and pithy in tribute, royal, and even the stern old martinet, Capt. Johnston, who handed

me my pass, remarked that "Your Canadians have a mighty sight less bluster than the Yanks, but, by George, they know how to fight, and there ain't an ounce of funk in them."
