#### ENGLAND'S WORK IN EGYPT.

The announcement that the last estone has been laid on the great Nile dam at Assouan calls attention again to one of the most gigantic undertakings ever entered upon for the Spenefit of a people, and incidentally to the work which the British have accomplished in Egypt during the past ten or twelve years. Great, indeed, as has been the material improvement of the country under the English occupation, that is the least part of the benefit which the Egyptians have derived from it. Under the sold system the Egyptian peasants were probably the most down-trodden people in the world. Their whole existence was a round of exactions to supply the wants and luxuries of the officials who were placed over them in almost endless gradation. They were infinitely worse off than slaves, for frequently their masters did not leave them enough even to feed themselves and their families. All that the English have changed.
