International Bible Lescons for To-Morrow—Jesus and the Sabbath -

Golden Text-"It is lawful to do well on the Sabbath day."

Here are two Sabbath day incidents in our Lord's ministry—one a neces-sary work, the other one of mercy. sary work, the other one of mercy. As usual, Scribes, Pharisees and hypocrites, religious fault-finders, were around, and shocked to see His hungry disciples, whom no one invites to a Sunday dinner, trying to stiffy themselves by rubbing out the ears as they went through a grain field; Jesus defends them by quoting a grave breach of the law, by David and his men eating the consecrated bread to satisfy their hunger, also the fact that the priests labored on the Sabbath,—and more than any other day,—yet were blameless, because the fact that the priests labored on the Sabbath,—and more than any other day,—yet were blameless, because they were in the service of the temple, while these disciples were in the service of the Lord of the Temple and of the Sabbath. Many religious people, who are in the spirit of these fault-finders, but not in the Spirit of Christ, now condemn all who do not keep the seventh day Sabbath, although the Lord of the Sabbath attends with all those who assemble in his name, and worship Him in spirit and in truth, and feeds those who hunger and thirst after righteousness, and heals more withered hearts on the first day of the week than ever He does on the seventh, which He would not do if they were not doing His will. But let us ever remember that Jesus, the Son of God, is Lord of every man and every day, as well as the Sabbath or the first day of the week. acts About the Work of This Excellent Organization—The Local Celebration.

There were other societies that

There were other accicties that printed the Holy Scriptures, before the origin of the British and Foreign Bible Society. Taey did a very noble and bleased work. We would remember them with grateful recognition and give them all honor, with thanksgiving to God for their work, but in every case either Bible circulation was a secondary work or the sphere of their operations was restricted. The British and Foreign Bible Society was the first Society whose one object was the circulation of the Holy Scriptures and whose field was the whole world.

Mary Jones was bern in a weaver's cottage at Llanfihangel in 1782. Her pious parents were too poor to own a Bible, but whes she was old enough they took her to a neighboring farm house, where she could hear the Word of God read. One day Mrs. Evans allowed the child to hold in her own hands the Bible and as she turned over the sucred pages she came to this passage, "Search the Scriptures." A strange longing took possession of her heart; she wanted to have a Bible of her own. In order to obtain it six years later she travelled twenty-five miles with her savings to the house of the Rev. Thos. Charles of Bala. In 1802 Mr. Charles told the story of Mary Jones at a meeting of the Religious Tract Society in London, mentioning at the same time the scarcity of Bibles throughout Wales, and the Rev. Joseph Hoghes, a Secretary of that Hociety, hearing it, rose up and said, Mr. Charles, why not for the world." So on March 7th, 1804, in the city of London, the British and Foreign Bible Society was born.

The Society has Auxiliaries and branches to the number of 7,900 in England, West Indies, Central America and Canada.

The strongest auxiliary is the Upper Canada Bible Society which was organized seventy-five years ago, and has now 627 branches.




