SOURCES OF OUR HISTORY.

Dr. Doughty's Plan For the Publication of a Set of Source Books of Canadian History.

One of Dr. Doughty's plans for the reorganization of the Canadian Archives is the publication of a set of source-books of Canadian history. Mention already has been made of this project, which will effect a remarkable change in the reports of the Archives. Hitherto these principally consisted of statements as to where documents containing certain information are to be found; henceforth select documents will be printed in full, and so made available. The grouping of documents so as to set forth political, constitutional, social or economic progress in the next step, and is being taken. Dr. Doughty and Prof. Short, of Queen's University, at present are working on a collection which should prove of the highest interest—a complete reprint of all the documents of constitutional development between the conquest and the introduction of representative Government in 1791. This is the period out of which the French and English disputes as to the rights of the colonies, and the relative rights of the two nationalities. The collection will be published as a separate volume.

To render the volume complete the editors have decided to include several central documents already in print, such as the terms of capitulation, the royal proclamations, the Quebec Act, the Constitutional Act, and other acts of importance relating to the powers and duties of the Colonial Governments. In addition to these better-known sources of information, which will not lose by being placed in close association, a great many documents will be included which relate to the efforts of the different colonial and Imperial interests to have the constitution altered or amended, together with the arguments with which these proposals were supported. The advice and comments of the Colonial Governments in seeking to direct the policy of the Home Government as to the rights and privileges to be granted to the Legislature, and as to the character of the laws and institutions—French, English and U. E. Loyalist, American—were to prevail, will be found in a place. The object is to give in the volume not only the bare bones of the constitution, but also the chief formative forces which caused it to take the line of development actually followed. Further, the volume will contain the leading alternatives which were then presented; some of these were afterwards returned to, or revised in modified forms, as for instance, Imperial Federation.

The editing will consist for the most part of biographical explanatory notes intended merely to give the connection of the documents. A general introduction will preface the work, stating the scope and object of the collection, and the editor will be made to interpret the documents or to draw any conclusions from them. The object is to furnish a fairly adequate basis of fact so that independent readers may form their own conclusions and furnish their own interpretations.

If the reception of the first volume is sufficiently encouraging, the editors may follow it with another volume of documents bearing on the development of representative to responsible Government, and perhaps from responsible Government to Confederation.

Comment on the importance of this project is scarcely needed. All that need be said is that the volume of the first, the book should be issued in a more suitable form than the bulky, inconvenient and perishable shape now binding, affected by blue-books. It should be a well-bound volume, of convenient size and proportions. Secondly, an adequate number should be issued, and an ample number kept for the future demand, with interest in the country's history—H. in Toronto News.

Within Four Years of Century.

The birthdays of King Edward and Mrs. Wm. Byers, of late street, Stratford, fall on the same day, Nov. 9, but the latter had been living thirty-two years when the former was born, and consequently, was last year just one and a half times as old as the King. Her faculties of sight and hearing are somewhat impaired, notwithstanding that she was able to recognize many callers to congratulate her on the occasion. She was born in Annan, Dumfriesshire, Scotland, Nov. 9, 1809, and has lived in the reign of five sovereigns of Great Britain. She came to Canada in 1842, and took up her residence in Downville, where her husband, the late William Byers, was a pioneer farmer. They spent twenty-three years on the farm, and then removed to Stratford to the residence still occupied by Mrs. Byers. Her husband died sixteen years ago, and to his bequest of \$4,700 was largely due the establishment of the Stratford General Hospital. He also bequeathed \$2,000 for the House of Refuge. The many friends of Mrs. Byers wish that her remaining days, so much prolonged beyond the usual span, will be peaceful and happy.
