Robe Patterns of Handkerchief Linen in Delicate Shades—A Distinct Economy For Amateur Dressmakers as They Come Ready to Put Together.

The coming season promises to go down in fashion's annals as one of lingerie gowns and robes. Handkerchief linen is the material that will be used on most of these creations.

The lingerie gown, whether it be a robe pattern or not, to be good form must not have its purity of outline

blurred by outstanding bows, frills or berths. It may be as rich as one's purse can afford as far as appliques, insertion and exquisite hand work are concerned, but the outline must be well defined so that the silhouette of the wearer will be clear cut and graceful.

Robe patterns of course need very little making, being trimmed, hemmed and ready to put together, and for this reason some women consider them a distinct economy. The robes come in velvet and in crepe de chine of the summer variety, as well as in lawn. These robe patterns are very easily made up by the amateur dressmaker. They have exactly shaped skirts, laced and banded with embroideries, and require only a little dext fitting with tucks about the waist line and a band to give them quite the air of the best Paris lingerie frock. Even the bodices to these afford little more labor, for they are embroidered and appliqued in such a fashion that a little tuck here and there will adapt them to any figure. White and all the light tints—lavender, pink, blues and greens—are favored in these embroidered robes.

The gowns seen in the illustration are both charming examples of the lingerie frock at its best. The princess model is carried out in pale blue handkerchief linen—that is, the deep tucked flounce and short puffed sleeves are of this

The Victoria Cross.

The intrinsic value of the Victoria cross, the most highly prized decoration in army and navy, is about 1 1/2 pence. It was instituted by royal warrant on Jan. 29, 1856, as a reward of gallantry of all ranks, and the first presentation (of sixty-two crosses) was made by the late Queen Victoria in person on Friday, June 26, 1857. It is in the shape of a Maltese cross and is made to this day out of metal from old Russian cannon captured at Sevastopol.—St. James' Gazette.

INTERNATIONAL BIBLE LESSON FOR TO-MORROW.

The Two Foundations—Matt. 7, 15-29. Read Matt. 6, 1-7, 14; Luke 6, 31-49.

Golden Text—"Be ye doers of the word and not hearers only."

Vc. 15-16—False prophets, not true men, true teachers, but simulating, double-faced professors, teachers whose hearts are unchanged by grace; they soon manifest the briars and thistles of the fall when God cursed the earth—see Gen. 3, 18—they are perverters and not converters.

Vc. 17-18—"Natural law in the spiritual world." Men resemble good and bad trees, fruit and not leaves or blossoms soon tell the tale. The good fruit is of the spirit of love and is of God, for God is love; and is envy, hatred, malice and all uncharitableness, and comes of the evil one. Impenitent, barren lives are treated as we treat useless timber, fit only for fire. Men and trees governed by a similar law of utility.

Vc. 21-23—"In that day!" Talk is cheap now; to tell Jesus Lord now implies we are His servants to obey; to neglect obedience is sin—lawlessness—and despite our boasting, Christian Science protests, the judgment seat of Christ demands that we be eternal outcasts.

Vc. 24-27—Contrast these two foundations, sand and rock. The Rock is Christ—the preacher—the Rock of Ages. A cloudburst soon tells the tale. Note how numbers of leading men are tumbling to ruin, during the legal investigations now going on; Christless lives result in ruin; ours will unless we are resting on the one foundation—Jesus Christ, the Son of the living God.

Vc. 28-29—"The multitudes were astonished at His teaching, more than we are, for to them He was only an uneducated carpenter from Nazareth, while we know Him as the Lord from Heaven. We make ourselves April and eternal fools if we neglect to rest our souls salvation on and in Him, and follow His directions.
