HALIFAX SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND.

We have received the twenty third Annual Report of the Board of Managers of the Halifax School for the blind.

During the past year 54 blind persons have been under instruction, 38 males, 16 females; 6 of these have graduated or left the school, and one has been removed by death, making the total attendance on December 31st, 1893, 47. Of these 21 are from Nova Scotia, 14 from N. B., 2 from P. E. Island, and 7 from Newfoundland. The different departments are managed with great care; the staff of teachers look after the physical, intellectual, social and moral welfare of the pupils; these pupils are taught useful occupations that will prove a source of profit to them in after years. The school does a grand work in looking after those who unfortunately are deprived of the sense of sight, and it is cheering to learn from this report that the labors of the managers and teachers are so far crowned with success.

The following pupils were enrolled from Kings Co.: Minnie Legge, Scotts Bay; Blanche Brewster, Ross Creek; Ernest Ogilvie, Harborville.

The width of tires on vehicles is a live question in many parts. The Ottawa city council has taken measures to provide by law for their governance. The narrow tires so frequently seen under heavy loads are manifestly injurious to the streets and highways. It has been shown by experts that wheels with tires 2 1/2 inches above the wear of wheels with 4 1/2 inch tires. An Ottawa paper says: "The best made road will, as may reasonably be expected, Ottawa is shortly to have paved streets, the present bylaw comes into force as they are injured proportionately with gravel or macadamized roads by small tires."

England leads in the matter of attention to wheels. The average width of the market wagon tire in France is 6 inches and it runs up to 10, while in the majority of four-wheeled freight wagons the rear axle is 14 inches longer than the fore axle for the purpose of making the rear wheels run on a line outside that of the fore wheels. In some of the states farmers are granted reduced taxes if they adopt wide tires. The injury done to these parts by the narrow tires is obvious and whether the law should not step in to regulate the matter is a question.
