

While the great aim of the Bureau will be to benefit the public, it hopes to be able to effect this without injury to the dealer. The dealer who sends in to the Bureau an order of reasonable size, accompanied by the cash for the same, is to receive his books free of transportation charges up to his railway station, and the 15 per cent discount which is allowed him in equivalent to a profit of 17 1/2 per cent, on his outlay. Along with this, the Bureau gives him a guarantee against loss through changes in the authorization of books. A comparison of this with what is customary in other provinces or states, where similar bureaus have been established, shows that the dealer in Nova Scotia are being generously dealt with for the usual allowance made to them elsewhere is only 10 per cent.

There are several other important benefits which are looked for from the establishment of the Book Bureau; but, leaving these out of consideration for the present, and looking at it merely from a pecuniary point of view, it may be said that while the liberal treatment accorded to the book-dealers leaves them not just ground for complaint, the still further lowering of the cost of school books which will be effected through it and the saving in this way of some thousands of dollars annually to the parents of pupils should prove highly satisfactory to them.


