CITY WILL BUY OLD JAIL SITE.

Ald. Young moved the offer be accepted and the matter left in the hands of the Finance Committee to arrange terms of payment.
The motion was seconded by Ald. Forrester and unanimously adopted.

A petition from Mr. Thomas Kitchin requesting the Council grade and construct a cement sidewalk in front of lots 1 and 2 block 57, facing Front street, was referred to the Street Committee for action.

The Fire Wardens reported they had instructed the City Engineer to notify the Gas Company to isolate the fire burning in the company's ash heap and they failing to do so, the City to do the work and charge the same up to the company.

City Engineer Owen reported an expenditure in wages during the past week of \$406.00 on streets and \$169.25 on waterworks.

Fire Chief John Parkin reported 18 fires during the month of August, 15 of the fires being grass and bush fires none of which were of a serious nature.

Ald. Forrester made a verbal report in connection with the appeal made by property owners on Haliburton street for redress from the Council in connection with the high cost of the pavement on Haliburton street. Ald. Forrester stated the committee had written the Inspector and had received a reply regarding Haliburton street. The committee had sent a second letter regarding the paving on other streets and as soon as a reply was received a report would be prepared and a special meeting of the Council called to deal with the matter.

On motion of Ald. Cavalsky, the Council decided to hold a sale of all property in arrears for taxes, on Thursday, Sept. 24th.

Ald. Young informed the Council it was reported the garrison was to be removed from Nanaimo and if so he thought the Council should take action at once and try if possible to keep the men here.

Ald. Shaw remarked the City had gone to considerable expense in fitting up quarters here and surroundings were suitable for the training of men. There was lots of ground and climatic conditions were good and there was no reason why a large number of men should not be stationed here.

Ald. Young moved, seconded by Ald. Shaw that the matter be referred to a special committee to draft a resolution and forward the same to the proper authorities protesting against the withdrawal of the local garrison. The motion was adopted, and Mayor Planta appointed Ald. Young, Coburn and McKenzie the committee to deal with the matter.

On motion of Ald. Coburn the first reading of the Parks and Squares Purchase Bylaw was deferred to the next meeting of the Council.
Council then adjourned.
