LAST WEEK.

Alms House Commissioners Held Annual Meeting at Chatham.

The annual meeting of the Northumberland Co., almshouse commissioners was held Tuesday at Chatham. In the keepers report it was stated that at present there were thirty inmates in that institution. Four tons of hay, four tons of oats, fifty-five barrels of potatoes, twenty barrels of turnips, 500 heads of cabbage, besides a quantity of other vegetables, were raised on the farm last season. Commissioners Underhill, Connors and Vinneau, appointed to examine the building, clothing and premises etc., reported everything to be in a satisfactory condition. After other routine business resolutions of condolence were adopted over the death of George Burchill, Jr., of Nelson, and John Graham, of Millerton.

At the annual meeting of the Almshouse Commissioners held at Chatham on Nov. 6th the following resolutions of condolence were adopted:—"Whereas it has pleased Almighty God in His infinite wisdom to remove from our midst, by the deaths of Geo. Burchill, Jr., of Nelson, and John Graham, Millerton, worthy citizens and esteemed friends. Therefore resolved—That we bow in submission to the Divine will we most deeply regret their demise, and further resolved—That by the decease of our late friends and colleagues our Board has lost active and zealous members and community honest and upright citizens, and that we extend to the bereaved families, in this their hour of sorrow, our heartfelt sympathy with them in the loss which they have sustained."
