The Dark Angel Enters Many Hamilton Homes.

The many friends of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Wilson, 22 Cannon street west, will regret the death of their youngest son, Robert, after a lengthy illness, yesterday afternoon.

Word has been received here of the death in Chicago of Thomas Lewis. He was the only son of the late Thomas Lewis, of this city.

The death occurred in Toronto yesterday of Mrs. Annie Hamilton at her late residence, 250 Parliament street. She was the wife of John E. Hamilton, farmer, of Brockton, Ancaster.

The remains of Charles A. Coutts, of Harbor Springs, Mich., arrived this morning, accompanied by his wife and sister, Mrs. George Thompson, of Brussels, and brother, Mr. Harry Coutts, and Rev. A. M. Elliot, the pastor of the Presbyterian Church of Harbor Springs.

The funeral of James Thomas took place this afternoon at 2 o'clock from his late residence, 30 Shaw street, to St. Matthew's Church, where service was conducted by Rev. Henry Britten.

All that was mortal of Mrs. Elizabeth Nicholson was laid at rest this afternoon, the funeral taking place from the residence of her son-in-law, Mr. George Aske, 153 Bay street north, Rev. J. B. Christie conducted the services, and the pallbearers were John and George Aske, Fred and Herbert Reed, William Griner and Charles Emms. There were many beautiful floral tributes.

Jane Hall, for many years an inmate of the Aged Women's Home, died yesterday in her 84th year. She was born in Scotland, but had resided in this city for many years. The funeral will take place on Friday morning at 9.45 to the Radial station, and the remains will be taken to Burlington for interment.

Mrs. Minnie Clode, wife of Harold Clode, passed away at St. Joseph's hospital, after an illness of three weeks' duration. She was 43 years of age. A husband and four sons, George, Fred, Edwin and John, were left to mourn her demise. SUICIDE IN JAPAN

Becoming More Frequent—Women and Young Give Large Percentage. A Russian statistician, Mr. Tarnowsky, is authority for the statement that the suicide has increased more than 140 to 100,000 inhabitants in the early '90's, it is now in excess of 205 annually. The old-fashioned method of hanging-kiri plays no part in the increase. It is practiced, if at all, only by members of the higher classes. Hanging and drowning are the usual methods of the people at large.

Women furnish a very unusual proportion of these tragedies. Whereas the proportion of the whole number of suicides to the population is about the same as in France, the number of women suicides is about twice as great. In France one-fifth of all cases are of women; in Japan they are two-fifths. Jealousy is the usual motive. For 500 French women kill themselves for themselves for every one that is 1,800 Japanese women.

Another strange feature is the rarity of those who are tired of life. In France about seventy-five children under 16 years of age commit suicide every year; in Japan the number is 225. In France about twenty-one out of every hundred suicides and in Japan about thirty-five are less than 30 years of age. The women are relatively a larger proportion among the young than the old.

Women in Japan furnish only 8 per cent of the total criminality of this empire, so Tarnowsky concludes. They are more virtuous yet more unhappy than European women.

Put Something On. Dean Stanley was once driving with a friend from Montreal to Palermo. Both men were reading. Stanley suddenly discovered that he was shivering with a cold. He mentioned the matter to his friend.

"Well, hadn't you better put something on?" said the latter, pointing to the dean's bag, which was close at hand. Stanley thought it rather a good idea, and the friend went on reading. As they entered Palermo the dean was shivering with cold. Stanley was placidly reading. His friend found that the distinguished churchman had absent-mindedly drawn out a night-shirt from his bag and put it on over his other clothing, and thus arrived was riding triumphantly into the city. — London Sketch.
