REFERENDUM BALLOT General Assembly To Meet Next Year In Toronto

Change Made from Vancouve on Account of Expense of the Trip to Coast City

Ottawa, June 9-The two import ant features at the fifteenth seder unt of the Presbyterian General A sembly this morning were the reco sideration of the place of meeting for next year, which will now be in Toronto instead of Vancouver as formerly dedded on, and the pass-ing of a motion which practically does away with the indeterminate term of pastorate of Presbyterian ministers. It was decided to send to presbyteries for their consideration the motion which recommended seven year term for ministers. was agreed, however, that should here be no application from either he minister or the congregation hat there would be no change.

During the discussion on the place meeting for next year there was lively scene when Rev. Dr. Pringle Sydney, supported a motion that the meeting be in Winnipeg.

Professon Welch, Montreal, alleged that the reason for Dr. Pringle's support was because of the question of organic union which will come up for discussion at the assembly Professor Welch insisted that Dr ringle was infavor of the union as were also the majority of the mem pers of the Assembly from Western Canada. It was just an attempt to ocalize the question, he said.

The reason given for the reconsideration of the place of meeting was that of economy. It was stated hat the cost to meet in Vancouver vould be \$100,000, while the cost if Toronto was decided on was \$25,000. owever, that the church union ques on was the real reason for bringing up the question again.

Toronto, Winnipeg, Vancouver and St. John were the cities voted on. out Toronto and Winnipeg were most strongly supported and the for ner was decided on by a vote of 125 to 150.

In a discussion which followed, the western members raised great ob-ections to holding the Assembly meetings in the East year after year The question of expense should not be considered for it would be greatly outweighed by the uniting influence t would have.

Judge Forbes, St. John, thought

it beneath the dignity of the Assembly to change its mind. There is something greater than dignity stat ed Rev. J. Rollins, Peterboro, and hat is economy.

Prohibition Vote On 10th Of July

Plebiscite to be Taken Four Weeks from Saturday

FREDERICTON, June 9 Satur day, July 10, was announced by Pre mier Foster, this morning, as the ical Prohibition Act.

The provincial government open-d their cabinet meeting here last evening and shortly before noon to the Premier gave out the date which had been reached for holding he plebiscite, and said that later on ue would issue a formal statement indicating the action taken by the government and stating the constitutions under which the glebiscite will be held.

There will be two questions re-ferred to the people in the plebiscite Premier Foster declared, one of which will be en the retention of the present prohibitory law and the other as to the sale of beer and light wines. The prohibition act was snacted in 1916 by the late provincial gorequent and was declared at the time to be the most drastic prohibitory act placed on the statute books of any province in Canada up to that time. It became law as a "war measure," with a provision that after the declaration of peace the Lisutemant Governos-in Council should have authority to name a


