General Assembly To Meet Next Year In Toronto

Change Made from Vancouver on Account of Expense of the Trip to Coast City

Ottawa, June 9.—The two important features at the fifteenth seditious of the Presbyterian General Assembly this morning were the reconsideration of the place of meeting for next year, which will now be in Toronto instead of Vancouver as formerly decided on, and the passing of a motion which practically does away with the indeterminate term of pastorate of Presbyterian ministers. It was decided to send to presbyteries for their consideration the motion which recommended a seven year term for ministers. It was agreed, however, that should there be no application from either he minister or the congregation that there would be no change.

During the discussion on the place of meeting for next year there was a lively scene when Rev. Dr. Pringle Sydney, supported a motion that the meeting be in Winnipeg.

Professor Welch, Montreal, alleged that the reason for Dr. Pringle's support was because of the question of organic union which will come up for discussion at the assembly. Professor Welch insisted that Dr. Pringle was in favor of the union as were also the majority of the members of the Assembly from Western Canada. It was just an attempt to localize the question, he said.

The reason given for the reconsideration of the place of meeting was that of economy. It was stated that the cost to meet in Vancouver would be \$100,000, while the cost if Toronto was decided on was \$25,000. Many veiled insinuations were made, however, that the church union question was the real reason for bringing up the question again.

Toronto, Winnipeg, Vancouver and St. John were the cities voted on, but Toronto and Winnipeg were most strongly supported and the former was decided on by a vote of 125 to 150.

In a discussion which followed, the western members raised great objections to holding the Assembly meetings in the East year after year. The question of expense should not be considered for it would be greatly outweighed by the uniting influence it would have.

Judge Forbes, St. John, thought it beneath the dignity of the Assembly to change its mind. There is something greater than dignity stated Rev. J. Rollins, Peterboro, and that is economy.

Rev. Dr. Pringle, in moving Winnipeg, as the place of meeting thought as it was the centre city of the Dominion, it was the logical place. Rev. Dr. Laddling, seconded.

Judge Forbes moved for St. John. A strong protest by Rev. Dr. Pringle, Sydney, was made at this morning's session of the General Assembly regarding the precedence at state functions. He stated he did not think His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire was to blame, rather the Secretary of State.

Prohibition Vote On 10th Of July

Plebiscite to be Taken Four Weeks from Saturday

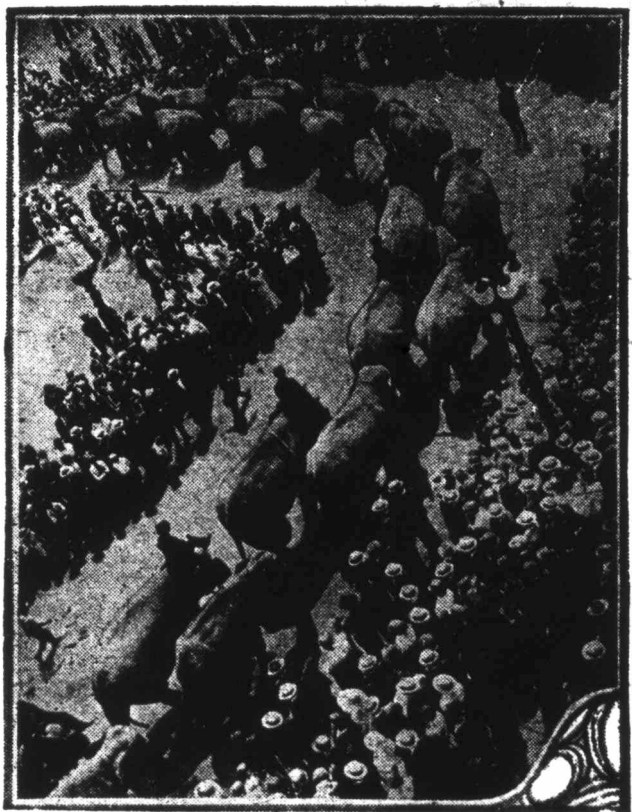
FREDERICTON, June 9.—Saturday, July 10, was announced by Premier Foster, this morning, as the date of the plebiscite on the Provincial Prohibition Act.

The provincial government opened their cabinet meeting here last evening and shortly before noon today the Premier gave out the date which had been reached for holding the plebiscite, and said that later on he would issue a formal statement indicating the action taken by the government and stating the conditions under which the plebiscite will be held.

There will be two questions referred to the people in the plebiscite. Premier Foster declared, one of which will be on the retention of the present prohibitory law and the other as to the sale of beer and light wines. In other words, there will be a simple ballot such as was used in the plebiscite in Quebec rather than a complicated lot of questions such as were submitted to the people of Ontario.

The prohibition act was enacted in 1916 by the late provincial government and was declared at the time to be the most drastic prohibitory act placed on the statute books of any province in Canada up to that time. It became law as a "war measure," with a provision that after the declaration of peace the Lieutenant Governor in Council should have authority to name a date for the holding of a plebiscite on the question of the retention or not of the act. It is under that authority the government is now proceeding in calling on the plebiscite.

The plebiscite will be the first election in New Brunswick under provincial laws at which women will have equal suffrage.

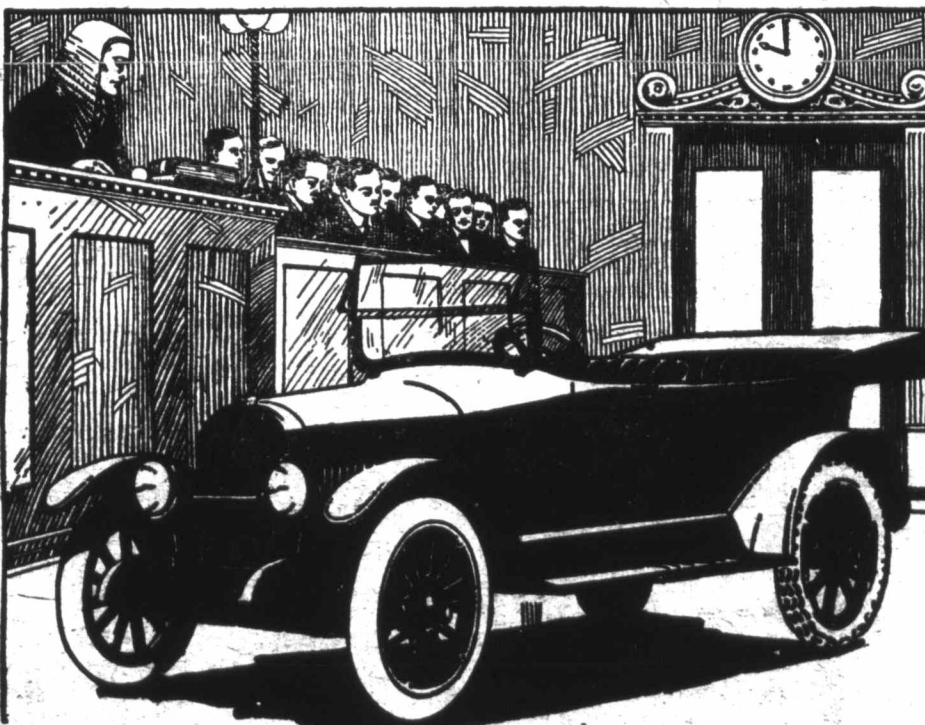
Buckwheat Cakes
2 cups buckwheat flour
1 cup flour
6 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups milk or milk and water
1 tablespoon molasses
1 tablespoon shortening
Sift together flours, baking powder and salt; add liquid, molasses and melted shortening; beat three minutes. Bake on hot greased griddle.

Waffles
2 cups flour
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups milk
2 eggs
1 tablespoon melted shortening
Sift flour, baking powder and salt together; add milk to yolks of eggs; mix thoroughly and add to dry ingredients; add melted shortening and mix in beaten whites of eggs. Bake in well greased hot waffle iron until brown. Serve hot with maple syrup. It should take about 1 1/2 minutes to bake each waffle.
